CITIZENS OF ST. JOHNS BITTER OVER RULING

Friends of Monnoir College Priests Intend to Take Case to the Vatican.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, Que., Aug. 12.—Despite the announcement of interested parties in Montreal that the priests of the college in St. John's, having now been repudiated by the archbishop of Montreal, and the bishop of St. Hyacinthe, and they continue the fight against their superiors, will now be disbanded as a teaching force, the large body of influential laymen supporting the fathers are going to take their appeal to the Vatican. While the priests have expressed a willingness to submit to the ruling of their superiors, they are being urged not to do so by the laymen in St. John's until the result of this last appeal is known. Bitter opinions were expressed in St. John's this morning over the decision of the Sacred Consistorial Congregation condemning the Monnoir College priests.

TYPO. CONVENTION OPENS

Twenty-Eighth Annual Gathering of Body Is On at Cleveland.

[Canadian Press.] Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 12.—With delegates present from all over Canada, the United States, and even Hawaii and the Philippines, the twenty-eighth annual convention of the International Typographical Union was opened here today. President James W. Wilson, of Cleveland, presiding. The Women's Auxiliary also is in session. Addresses of welcome and responses, with the appointment of several committees by President Wilson and the reports of officers occupied the initial session of the typographical union. Before the credentials committee it was announced that there would be a contest over the seating of Mrs. Frank Kennedy, of Omaha, Neb., who is declared to have been irregularly elected. There will be no election at this meeting. Montreal, New York, Nashville, Tenn., and San Antonio, Texas, are after the next convention.

PRISONERS ESCAPE

Whitehall, Mont., Aug. 12.—While handcuffed together Melvin Jewell and John Adams, convicts from the Montana state penitentiary, who were being returned from Big Timber, where they had been taken as witnesses, yesterday escaped from officers by jumping from a Northern Pacific train traveling 30 miles an hour. The men leaped through a window and rolled down a steep embankment. The spot where the escape was effected is a wild one near the main divide of the Rocky Mountains, where two overland Northern Pacific trains were held up by bandits about five years ago. Two posers with bloodhounds are in pursuit, but no trace of the men has been discovered.

ATROCITIES BY MEXICAN REBELS

Soldiers and Passengers on a Train the Victims of Great Brutality.

NO MERCY WAS SHOWN

Fingers of Women and Men Chopped Off in Order to Get at Their Rings.

Mexico, City, August 12.—Thirty-six soldiers and more than twenty passengers were slaughtered by Zapatistas in a canyon one kilometre north of Tlucman, 110 miles southeast of Mexico City, yesterday when a passenger train southbound from this city, was attacked from ambush. Only meagre details had reached this city tonight. So far as known only part of the train crew escaped.

The first news of the assault was sent to Mexico City by Conductor Marin and Collector Dominguez, who, although wounded, had managed to make their way to Yauhtepac, twelve miles away. They were forced to steal through the Zapatista lines and did not arrive at the telegraph station until the afternoon.

After a murderous rifle fire had ceased, the rebels swarmed down the hillside and set fire to the three cars composing the train. A few of the wounded had crawled out, onto the right-of-way, thus escaping the fate of those unable to leave the cars, which were burned. According to reports the leaders of the rebels made absolutely no efforts to restrain their men from acts of brutality greater than any that has yet marked the campaign in the south. The wounded, pleading for their lives, were struck down without pity and even looting was held in abeyance until the slaughter was complete.

Horrible Atrocities. Not satisfied with robbing their victims in an ordinary manner, the fingers of the men and women were chopped off with machetes, that rings they wore might be more quickly obtained. Ornaments were torn from ears of women and their bodies were otherwise mutilated.

Among the passengers were two newspaper men, and they were among the killed. They were on their way to interview Zapata, the chief of the rebels.

One of these, H. L. Straus, a native of Uruguay, and consular agent of his country in this city, was employed at one time on The New York Herald. He was making this trip to see Zapata as a representative of El Heraldo of El Pais.

Will Punish Perpetrators. The ill-fated train left Mexico City yesterday morning. Most of the passengers belonged to the farmers and lower classes. The soldiers, who had been retained to act as guards, were from the Eleventh Battalion, commanded by Lieut. Reynosa.

NEVER HEARD OF FIREMEN

Montreal Couple Badly Burned Trying to Put Out Fire.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, Aug. 12.—Never having heard of a fire department, Mrs. L. Schoop, and her boarder, Aramis, recently arrived, tried to put out a fire in the kitchen of a house on Leber street. The blaze was started by an explosion of an oil stove. Mrs. Schoop continued to throw water on the flames even after her clothes and hair were in flames. When the neighbors rushed into the building both the woman and her boarder were found unconscious on the floor. When restored Beby explained that he did not know there was a fire engine, and that they had none in his country.

INFERNAL MACHINE SENT TO A GIRL

North Carolinian Was Enraged When His Love Was Spurned.

MISTAKE MADE IN BILLING

Bomb Goes to Wrong Place and Blows Up the Express Office.

Greensboro, N. C., Aug. 12.—Startling disclosures indicating that the infernal machine which exploded in the High Point office of the Southern Express Company Saturday, was destined for a High Point society girl, followed rigid investigation of the mystery today by United States District Attorney A. E. Holton and Police Chief Ridge.

Revelations said to have been made by this woman to the authorities have caused the police to search for a man who lived at Thomasville, N. C., who is said to have good business and social connections.

The inquiry, the authorities assert, has established the fact that the infernal machine which seriously wounded W. M. Ribbes, the express company manager, and his cashier, Alton Morton, when it exploded in the office, was sent from Thomasville.

Until an arrest is made officials decline to reveal names of persons concerned in the case, though they state that it has been positively ascertained that the package concealing the deadly machine was intended for a High Point girl rather than for Postmaster Charles Hoover, of Thomasville.

It is said that the package was entered at the Thomasville office Dec. 2, last, and that through a mistake in billing it was waybilled to "Charles Hoover, High Point." The original shipping tag, it is declared, however, bore the name and address of a High Point girl. Expressmen made unsuccessful inquiries for the young woman, declaring that it could hardly have been meant for her and Saturday were on the point of consigning it to the "Old Hess" heap when it exploded.

No explanation for the error in waybilling has been offered. The young woman to whom the package was addressed is said to have conferred with District Attorney Holton today. She is reputed to have declared that the suspect became infuriated last fall when she scorned an offer of marriage and that he declared that he would send high cargo, declaring that the package, which he held as presents from her, the police allege, contained the infernal machine which exploded in the hands of expressmen Saturday.

FORECASTS WEATHER FROM SPOTS ON SUN

Astronomer Predicts Storms That Will Sweep Across Continent This Month.

[Canadian Press.] Santa Cruz, Aug. 12.—That the invisible agency connecting the sun and earth is electro-magnetic is announced by Rev. J. S. Ricard, in charge of the observatory at Santa Clara College, who recently made public a method of forecasting the weather from sun spots. Father Ricard also gives out a list of dates of disturbances for the Pacific coast up to the end of the first week of September, as follows: Aug. 14 to 17, September, as follows: Aug. 27 to 31, and Sept. 3 to 6. According to Father Ricard these disturbances will cross to the Atlantic States and plunge into the Atlantic Ocean.

A new feature of our forecasting, the statement continues, "is that even though a solar storm vanishes entirely from sight and is yet, by following its attenuated and dying traces right around the parallels of solar latitude and applying our rule—a very simple arithmetic formula—the same results are obtained as when a spot in the full vigor of life crosses the invisible hemisphere."

A Quick Change. Tampa, Fla., Aug. 12.—An unprecedented drop of the thermometer was registered at the weather bureau here yesterday when the mercury tumbled 35 degrees in 30 minutes during a squall. The sun was shining brightly when the squall came up, the thermometer registering 94. In 30 minutes fall weather prevailed.

DAVIS MAN AND WOMAN REMANDED FOR WEEK

Toronto Police To Investigate Further Operations of Alleged Bank Robbers.

Toronto, Aug. 13.—Walter Davis, alias Walsh, and Alice Davis, also alias Walsh, appeared in the police court yesterday morning on charges of having in their possession money stolen from the Bank of Montreal at New Westminster, and were remanded a week. Both pleaded not guilty, and reserved election. An application for bail was emphatically refused. T. C. Robinette, K.C., appeared as their counsel. Acting Inspector of Detectives Guthrie received an answer to his wire to the police of New Westminster, and an officer starts from that city today to take the couple back West.

Through her counsel Mrs. Davis asked that \$100 of the American money found in her possession be turned over to her for her expenses, but the crown attorney objected, because he believed much of the money had been changed here. Eventually \$50 was given her.

Davis is not believed by the Detroit police to be the same man who was held there recently on a similar charge. Lieut. Thomas Lally, of the force of that city, said that the description furnished for the Toronto prisoner did not tally with that of the man who was held there, Martin Powell, who is still in the county jail, and a man named Frank Davis, who was arrested in the Griswold House after they had changed a large number of Canadian bills. Through an error of the police captain Davis was released, and subsequent efforts to rearrest him were futile.

In Vancouver it is believed that Davis was not actually concerned in the cracking of the safe. Dean, the man arrested in New Westminster, was called in the police court yesterday and remanded.

FRENCH PREMIER AT RUSS CAPITAL

M. Poincaré Coming in for a Lot of Attention From Czar.

[Canadian Press.] St. Petersburg, Aug. 12.—The French Premier, Raymond Poincaré, who recently came to the Russian capital to confer with the Russian ministers on questions relating to the Near East and to the Franco-Russian naval convention, had a half-hour private interview with Emperor Nicholas yesterday. After luncheon at Peterhof Palace with the Emperor and Empress, and the subsequent private audience with his majesty, M. Poincaré attended a brilliant review by Emperor Nicholas of 60,000 troops at Krasnoe Selo.

In the evening the French Premier dined with Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian army, after which he was a guest at a theatrical performance in the camp, to which he and the cabinet ministers and grand dukes attended. The French visitor everywhere is being shown the greatest attention.

THE FRANKFURT SAFE

Emigrant Ship Towed Into the Hook of Holland.

Rotterdam, Aug. 12.—The North German Lloyd steamship Frankfurt, which was reported by the Iris at London yesterday to have collided with the German steamer Barmen off the Hook of Holland lightship while on the voyage to Canada from Bremen with 1,200 emigrants on board, entered the Hook of Holland today towed by four tugs. Of her passengers 490 were still on board, the remainder having been transferred to the Dutch steamer Juno. The Barmen, which was on the way from Rotterdam for Bremen, has also arrived at the Hook of Holland.

FIRE AT GRANBY.

Granby, Que., Aug. 12.—Fire, which at 6 a.m. threatened to wipe out the manufacturing portion of this town, yesterday destroyed the plant of the Meyer Thomas Company, box manufacturers, on Court street. A timely rainstorm prevented the blaze from spreading. The loss is estimated at \$150,000.

DIED IN THE WOODS.

Abbot's Corners, Que., Aug. 12.—The body of Hanson Clark, a 75-year-old farmer, was found in the woods this morning. Clark has been missing for a week, and it is supposed that he lost his way in the forest and died from starvation.
