Astronomer Predicts Storms That Will Sweep Across Continent This Month.

Santa Cruz, Aug. 12.—That the invisible agency connecting the heavens and earth is electro-magnetism is announced by Rev. J. S. Ricard, in charge of the observatory at Santa Clara College, who recently made public a method of forecasting the weather from sun spots.

Father Ricard also gives out a list of dates of disturbances for the Pacific coast up to the end of the first week of States and plunge into the Atlantic

"A new feature of our forecasting," the statement continues, "Is that even though a solar storm vanishes entirely from sight and no telescone in existence can reach it, yet, by following its attenuated and dying traces right around the parallels of solar latitude and applying our rule—a very simple arithmetic formulae—the same results are obtained as when a spot in the full vigor of life crosses the invisible hemisphere.
