Polo Grounds, New York, Oct. 6.—Waite Hoyt, youthful Yankee pitcher, garnered the second victory for his team in the contest for the world baseball title this afternoon. It was while Rawlings, the Giants' second baseman, was throwing him out at first in the fourth inning that Ward, Yankee second baseman, scored the American's initial run. McNally also tried to get home, but was caught at the plate when Kelly pegged from first to Smith. Artie Nehf, McGraw's star southpaw, fought hard, but Hoyt proved master on the mound. Nehf lost favor with the crowd when he threw four consecutive balls to "Babe" Ruth on his first trip to the plate.

It was an ideal day for the game. Typical Indian summer weather prevailed. The sun shined like a burnished disk in a clear sky, and the fans in the bleachers were grateful for the light westerly breeze. Although the crowd came late more than 30,000 fans were in their seats when the batteries were announced. The band played tunes for the edification of the ground-keepers and bleachers, before the bulk of the crowd came.

"Babe" Ruth flew over the Polo Grounds in a seaplane, dropping baseballs containing good luck messages to her husband. When Ruth himself walked on to the field the crowd howled its welcome and the band played "Over There."

City Grocers Are Planning War On Market Hucksters

KIWANIS TO
BLAZE AID TRAIL
FOR FATHERLESS

Will Ask Quebec and Ontario Members To Unite in Attaining Objective.

MANY FOR CONVENTION

Utmost Enthusiasm Prevails On Part of City Club Members.

In a determined effort to further the cause of "underprivileged" boys, not only in London, but throughout Ontario and Quebec, more than twenty Kiwanians leave London late Thursday afternoon for Montreal, to attend the annual convention of the Kiwanis Clubs of these two provinces.

The local delegation will press upon the Montreal conference that all the Kiwanis organizations of the district assume as their main objective the same aims and ambitions of the London club—the furthering of activity among fatherless clubs. Hugh Murray, chairman of the London objective committee, will present the appeal on behalf of the club.

After due consideration several weeks hence, the London Kiwanis settled this task as their main objective. The idea was quickly grasped by all the members. The utmost enthusiasm was evidenced, and 25 boys, from the ages of 11 to 14, were first taken over. Subcommittees were formed, responsible for the education, religious activity and other general developments of the boys in charge.

This was so satisfactory that in time the number of wards was increased to 50. The members undertake that these youngsters do not lack for adequate clothing, education, Y. M. C. A. advantages, etc. A Junior Kiwanis Club was formed, with a special room, allotted them for meetings at the Y. M. C. A. On Sundays they meet at 10 a.m., to hear good talks on boy problems from a religious viewpoint.

Going to Convention. Under the supervision of the Y. M. C. A. secretary a camping party was held for two weeks last summer, and complete success was noted. It is the hope of the local members that with this undertaking adopted by all the Kiwanians of the district more than 1,000 underprivileged boys will eventually become wards of the association, and so benefit thereby.

Kiwanian Murray says that already he has broached the suggestion to members of outside clubs and expresses the belief that the scheme will be enthusiastically adopted. Some 600 delegates will attend the Montreal conference. Western Ontario will be well represented. Among the London delegates included are Kiwanians A. Heaman, Mitchell, Joe Hickey, Harry McCallum, Arthur Ford, Ernie Dennis, Harry Muir, Tom Roy, Hugh Murray and J. Taylor.

CITY GROCERS MAY LAUNCH
BIG CO-OPERATIVE BAKERY

The retail grocers of the city are talking over at Wednesday night's meetings, and it may be that something will come out of it. In the meantime the grocers are getting bread at 8 1/2 cents from some of the bakers and selling it at 10 cents. Many of the grocers are pressing their east end fellow-traders to sell them some of their bread, and it may be that, pending a decision on the question of a large co-operative concern, that some of the other grocers may get some of the cheaper bread.

John Bridge, who was in a large measure responsible for the present bread war, addressed the grocers, laying out a proposition before them. At his request the details were withheld pending the grocers' decision on Monday, but it is understood that the co-operative feature is also involved.

Several changes in the working conditions affecting the employees have been suggested by the Canadian National Express Company. Notification to this effect has been received by Albert Hall of this city, general secretary of the C. N. E. Employees' Association, as a whole and vice-chairman of that organization in Ontario.

The proposed new schedule will be discussed by the employees' committee of the C. N. E. at a meeting to be held in Montreal during the first part of next week. Local representatives have been notified that they should be in that city by Sunday next.

It is more than likely that the employees of the company will refuse to accept any great changes in the present working conditions, according to Mr. Hall. The general grievance committee has the power to refuse or accept the new schedule as they see fit unless it embodies changes so important that the committee consider they should go before the local judges.

Along with the proposed schedule of working conditions, a new wage scale will be presented by the company for the consideration of the committee. No intimation has been given up to the present time of the changes proposed in the present rates of pay.

Aldermen Decline To Approve of Deals They Knew Nothing About.

DECLARE INDEPENDENCE

Will Go To Port Stanley To Examine Land Involved in Trade.

The directors of the London and Port Stanley Railway, composed of members of the council, and supposed to be the city's safety valve on matters railway, issued a declaration of independence at a meeting held in the city clerk's office Thursday morning and declined to approve of a couple of propositions without knowing what they are.

Ald. P. J. Watt voiced the opinion of the aldermen present when he said that the time for passing on matters that the directors knew nothing about had passed. It was time to call a halt.

Turned Them Down. The halt was called, for both propositions were turned down.

The first asked for approval of a new agreement between the Michigan Central Railway and the London and Port Stanley Railway. A copy of the agreement was not attached.

Promptly and with considerable anger the aldermen rejected the proposal without at least getting an eye on the agreement.

Halt Land Trade. In this present matter they next tackled a matter relating to a change in the deed of property at Port Stanley. It is really an exchange between the railway and the village of Port Stanley, and it would seem that some time ago the deed was approved. Then it was found that the description of the property was faulty, and it came back for a second approval. This was not forthcoming.

"Let us see what we are doing. We will not agree to this until we have had a chance to go over the property," said Mr. Watt, and Ald. Weir agreed. It was decided to go down to Port Stanley on Friday and look over the property.

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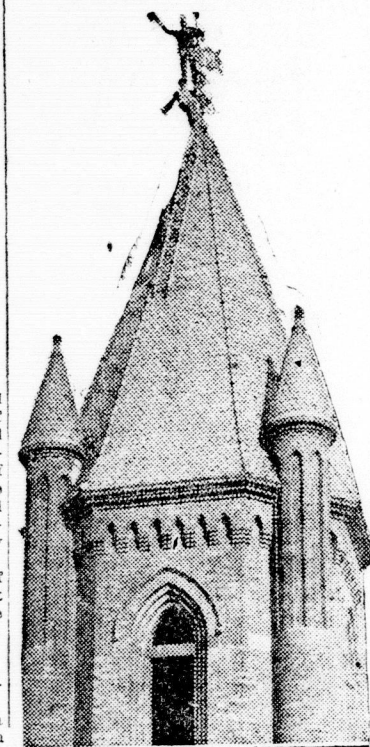
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Defying Death
Intrepid Steeplejack Making Repairs to Spire at First Methodist Church.

HUNDREDS of people witnessed with awe and wonder "Dutch" Mitchell, the famous American steeplejack, working at a dizzy height on the spire at the First Methodist Church for the past two days. In the above picture he is seen standing on the weather vane and being supported by his comrade, Joe Rodgers, of New York.

Midway up the spire is "Frenchie" a London boy, who is being initiated into the ways of the steeplejacks' trade.

"Dutch" Mitchell has been seen in London before at his precarious work. He repaired the steeple of St. Andrew's Church 18 years ago and nearly lost his life in so doing, when he fell more than twenty feet only saving himself by catching the ridge pole.

Mr. Mitchell has worked on the Woolworth and Singer buildings in New York.

Bride of Day
Takes Life

New York Woman Says Marriage Was Mistake.

New York, Oct. 6.—Mrs. Jennie Moore, a bride of a day, was in a hospital today, suffering from the effects of poison, the police say, with suicidal intent.

Thomas Moore, a city employee, told the police his bride took the poison last night, crying that she had made "a terrible mistake" in marrying him. He showed them a letter with the salutation: "My Dear Old Pal and Sweetheart," which, he said, she had in the bosom of her dress. It was addressed to a man in Elizabeth, N. J., expressed the bride's sorrow because she had married another, and said she was "ending" by taking my life.

JAPANESE EMPEROR'S CONDITION IS SERIOUS

Tokio, Oct. 6.—Emperor Yoshihito, whose illness has been causing alarm in Japan, is said to be worse, in an official statement issued here. It declared his condition is most unsatisfactory.

At the Imperial household it is explained that the emperor's physical condition is still becoming more aggravated. The difficulty he has experienced in walking and holding conversation has been augmented, while his memory and capacity for attention have declined. There are signs that he has been suffering from a severe disease of the brain, and it is recalled that during his infancy he was seriously ill, his malady recurring after it attained his majority. Since his coronation he has gradually weakened in mind and body.

Last of Confederation
Fathers in Hospital

MONTREAL, Oct. 6.—Albert Hager, lumber merchant at Plantagenet, Ont., the only survivor of Sir John A. MacDonald's first parliament under Confederation, is in the Montreal General Hospital, where he has undergone a minor operation to one of his ears. He looks uncommonly well for a man nearly 95 years of age.

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WILL REQUEST
COUNCIL TO
AMEND BYLAW

Action Is Considered at Meeting of Association On Wednesday Evening.

EVASION IS ALLEGED

Claim Citizens Are Paying Exorbitant Prices For Products.

London retail grocers plan to open war immediately against the wholesalers they declare are infesting the market and buying up produce, with the result that both the public and the merchant are forced to pay exorbitant prices. At a meeting of the association Wednesday night this matter was discussed at some length, with the result that a committee was appointed to wait on the 11 committee of the association at its next regular meeting and ask that the bylaw be amended so as to prevent hucksters operating to the detriment of the buying public and legitimate merchants who are taxpayers.

There is a bylaw already on the books which was aimed to limit the activities of hucksters. It states that they must not sell goods purchased on the market.

The grocers allege that the hucksters are evading this bylaw by making their purchases over the telephone from the farmers and then having the goods delivered on the market. At last night's meeting a number of instances were cited in which it was claimed that the hucksters had cornered supplies, getting down on the market early and having their supplies delivered.

The prices for these goods were said to be higher than those of the wholesalers, and when farmers came in with their produce they asked the same prices as the hucksters were asking, with the result that the citizens have to pay much more than they could have purchased for otherwise.

"This practice is costing the citizen of London thousands of dollars every year," said one of the speakers. "We intend to fight it through the council and endeavor to have what we regard as a real menace removed."

MAY FOLLOW TORONTO NIGHT CLASS PLAN

Attendance Officer in Favor of Starting With Four.

That the London Board of Education may well follow the example of the Toronto educational authorities with respect to public school night classes was the opinion expressed to The Advertiser Thursday by Dr. George Weir, public school attendance officer. Dr. Weir is championing a scheme for the inauguration of the plan in this city, and made recommendation to that effect at the last meeting of the board.

"Night classes have been in progress in Toronto public schools with excellent results," said Dr. Weir. "The trustees there have established fifteen classes, but I would be in favor of four classes for London in event of the board regarding my proposal favorably. These could be selected, one for each of the wards, for instance."
