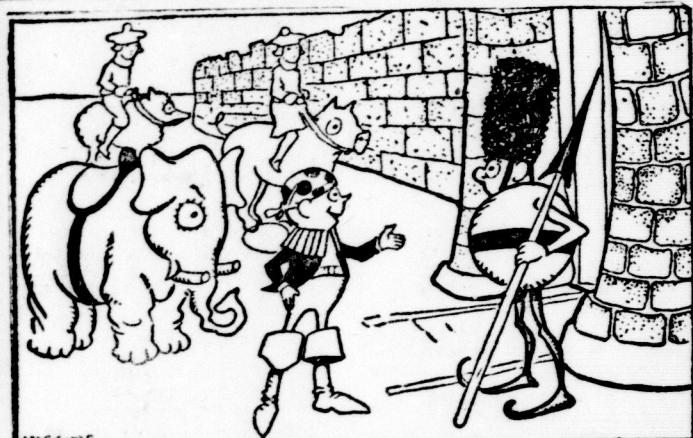
Sweet or sour milk, many eggs or few may be used. The more eggs the richer the waffle.

Sour Milk Waffles.
One egg, 2 cups sour milk, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons melted butter. Add 1/2 cup of egg well beaten. Mix perfectly smooth and beat in melted butter. Add milk and beat with an open spoon or a strong double beater. Fold in the white of the egg beaten stiff and dry. Put one tablespoonful of the batter in each section of the iron and cover.
