IRISH DEMAND FULL PROBE OF PETTIGOE CASE

Provisional Troops Take Serious View of Attack Made by British.

UNITES SINN FEIN

Collins and de Valera Issue Joint Appeal, Calling For Solidarity.

BULLETIN.

London, June 6.—Arthur Griffith and his colleagues on the Irish delegation which has been discussing the Irish situation with the British cabinet will leave Dublin tonight, it is announced, for a resumption of their negotiations with Colonial Secretary Churchill tomorrow.

DUBLIN, June 6.—Michael Collins, head of the Irish provisional government, takes a most serious view of the British shelling of Pettigo in Free State territory, and has demanded from the British authorities a full inquiry into the circumstances.

It has been supposed that the Irish troops at Pettigo were irregulars, not under control of the provisional government, but an official communiqué issued tonight from the Irish Republic Army, declares that there were no Irish troops in that district, except those of the regular Republican army.

It is denied in the communiqué that the British troops were at any time fired upon, and the British army statement that in consequence of the shooting of a motor car driver, Pettigo was shelled, is contradicted.

The driver, it is asserted, was not killed until long after the shelling, when there was an interchange of shots between the British and the retreating Irish troops.

According to the British statement, one shell was fired while the people were at mass, and eight others without warning of provocation immediately afterwards. Seven British troops were killed and several captured. The British at present occupy the hill and vantage points for two miles on the Donegal side, and all roads are traversed by British armored cars.

In any circumstance, the joint appeal of de Valera and Collins is likely to have the effect of discouraging candidates against the Sinn Féin ticket, and the Pettigo incidents are considered as an aid in bringing about solidarity for securing no contests for many seats.

REOPEN NEGOTIATIONS.

LONDON, June 6.—When the Irish representatives return to London tomorrow, says the political correspondent for the Evening News, they will resume discussions with the British cabinet will center mainly on the point as to whether Ireland shall be subject, as all other dominions, to the final decision of the judicial committee of the British Privy Council on all constitutional questions.

The correspondent says that in the draft of the Irish constitution submitted to the British government last week it was proposed that the final court authority on such questions affecting Ireland should be the Irish court of appeals.

The correspondent says that apart from this question, the answers of the Free State representatives proved satisfactory to the British on all specific questions put to them.

HOSPITAL FIRED ON.

Belfast, June 6.—Belfast was mystified last night by the intense fire which continued firing in the vicinity of the Mater Infirmary adjoining the Crumlin road jail.

A number of bullets struck the wall of the hospital and six windows were pierced. Consternation reigned among the patients and those who were able left their beds, taking refuge on the floor. The police combed

Must Keep Pace.

Mr. Garbutt further stated that were the Methodist Church to keep its place in the van of social service endeavors, a place gained for it, by reason of the fact that it had been the first to enter this great field of service to humanity. It must redouble its efforts in this direction in order to keep pace with churches of other denominations which were continually expanding their work in social service.

"While other churches are continually forging ahead," said Mr. Garbutt, "we must not allow ourselves to become weary after the strenuous efforts we have set forth for the past years."

Rap Race Meets.

The resolution reads: "We desire to express our condemnation of the pernicious influence of the race meets in Ontario and desire to warn the people against the demoralizing effects of race track gambling and to urge the earnest co-operation of all with every force which aims to destroy this evil which is such a menace to the citizenship of our fair province. We desire to commend the attorney-general for the strenuous and persistent efforts to offset these evils, and further we would petition the Dominion government, which has control of the matter, to enact a law prohibiting betting at all race tracks meets."

Approval of the proposal to establish a home in Western Ontario for the care and protection of unfortunate girls, and the highest appreciation of Rev. W. E. Millson in his work, were contained as well in the report with the following recommendations for district secretaries: London, W. L. Hiles; Stratford, T. E. Sawyer; Wingham, J. R. Will Pay By Check.

A recommendation was prepared by the conference for submission to the various districts that pastors be paid every month by check, instead of the present system, which has been found in a number of cases to be most unsatisfactory.

As an attempt to control more effectively, through the pastors, the religious ministers, their personal habits and the example set by the congregation by them, a memorial was submitted to the Monday afternoon sessions of the conference for consideration before being further submitted to the general conference, asking that the discipline of the Methodist Church be so amended

COUNCIL CLOSES NO. 4 FIRE HALL

Motion To Pay Aldermen \$25 Monthly Passes Third Reading.

Victoria Park Closed To Vehicular Traffic, Sundays and Holidays.

WHAT THE CITY COUNCIL DID:

Ordered No. 4 fire hall closed, and reduction of fire department staff by six men.

Recommended that the government be urged to exempt municipalities in Canada from payment of stamp charges on checks.

Passed second reading of bylaw authorizing remuneration of \$25 per month to aldermen.

Decided to close Victoria Park to vehicles on Sundays and holidays.

Postponed action on debentures for north end sewer until next regular meeting.

Provided that a motion presented to the city council by Ald. John Ashton Monday night passes its third reading, London's city fathers will receive pay for their services at the rate of \$25 per month each.

The motion, which was seconded by Ald. Ashton, stipulates that such remuneration is not to exceed \$300 per year, and is to be effective from the date of election.

Opposed Motion.

Although Ald. Ashton pointed out that the council has previously approved of the principle, Ald. O. I. Cunningham vigorously opposed the motion.

"I take strong objection," he declared, "to this council being elected by the people, not expecting remuneration. Then when they get in they ask for it. It should have effect next year. No man needs to come in. It looks like grafting on the taxpayers to do it. To me it is an outrage."

"We have no right to obligate next year's council," interrupted Ald. Douglas.

"If a man isn't worth his salt he shouldn't be on the council," said Ald. Ashton. "I think the people will get better service if they pay."

"Well, I'll give mine to the Children's Hospital," declared Ald. Cunningham as the motion incorporating this clause into the salary bylaw passed its second reading.

Protests Against Delay.

While the majority of the council seemed to favor restoring the garbage department employees' wages to the status held prior to the recent 10 per cent reduction, the matter was laid over until next meeting.

Ald. Ashton protested against delay, pointing out that these employees had never received large wages.

"I don't know how any alderman who has a heart could refuse to support these men," said Ald. Ashton. "They have the dirtiest job in the city."

"I am not opposed to the principle, but the motion is worded wrong," explained Ald. Douglas.

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Perfects Invention To Enable Planes To Rise and Land In Small Spaces

London, June 6.—A successful helicopter, dream of aviators, has been devised by Louis Brennan, with the aid of the British government, according to the Pall Mall Gazette, which declares a new era in aviation has begun. Mr. Brennan was the inventor of the Brennan torpedo and the gyroscopic monorail.

It is claimed the new helicopter can rise from and land on a small roof, hover stationary in the air, rise to a height of 2,000 feet, and fly 50 miles an hour. All these requirements were to have been fixed by the British air ministry, which was preparing to offer for their fulfillment a prize of £25,000. The newspaper states that they have all been met by Brennan's machine, air.

which, with the greatest possible safeguards for secrecy, was built in a huge airship shed at the royal aircraft establishment in South Farnborough, Hampshire.

"It is the most important and far-reaching accomplishment, yet attained in the history of flying," declares the Gazette.

The newspaper predicts the helicopter will bring flying into everyday business and social life, and, owing to its purposes its ability to hover stationary over a given spot gives it almost incalculable value. It has, moreover, the quality of virtual invisibility, owing to the blurred appearance of the rotating surfaces which keep it suspended in the air.

Charging the grand jury empanelled at the opening of the Middlesex county court, Judge Talbot Macbeth said: "I wish you, and ask you, to inspect the county jail. I also wish you to inspect the Ontario Hospital for the insane."

Judge Macbeth warned the jury-men that as representatives of the public they possessed every right to inspect any public institution.

He pointed out that in the past it had been customary for the grand jury to visit any place where anyone was deprived of their liberty or confined against their will.

The judge also expressed the hope that the jury would visit the House of Refuge in Strathroy. He made this request on account of the fact that the day after last inspection, a letter alleging certain complaints had been received, and was now before the county court.

On conclusion, Judge Macbeth reminded the jury-men that apart from these investigations their only duty lay in considering the criminal cases on the docket, and returning either a true bill or no bill on them.

The jury-men, immediately after being charged, turned to the consideration of the criminal cases.

The three cases before them are as follows: Julian Siskind, charged with allowing his premises to be used for purposes of illegal betting or book-making; Morris Zinberg, for alleged breach of the inland revenue act; Frank Good, charged with a misdemeanor.

David Pazzman, charged with theft, has elected trial and will appear Friday.

The killing of the Italian at Oakville Sunday night is near a solution, it was learned this afternoon, says the Star. Arrests are expected within 24 hours.

Although the dead man has not been identified, the picture taken at the morgue in Oakville has been of great assistance to the police in unravelling the case.

BREWERS IN WEST PROTEST NEW TAX

Calgary, Alta., June 6.—Brewers of Western Canada, at a meeting here yesterday protested the 10 cents a gallon sales tax on beer and also the sales tax on light wines and beverages. The brewers say they are having sufficiently hard struggles to make a living as it is during these prohibition times without the extra tax to pay.

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WELFARE PLANS NOW UNDER WAY

Campaigners Meet Tuesday To Prepare Canvass of Larger Subscribers.

Reid and Pocock to Provide Dinners for Committee Members.

For the purpose of preparing for a canvass of the larger subscribers to the Welfare Campaign, to be conducted next week, there will be a meeting of the general executive of the campaign, and directors of the chamber of commerce Tuesday afternoon.

Some thirty businessmen of the city are expected to attend the meeting. It is hoped that the campaign will start with a large sum already subscribed from the bigger subscribers. An announcement of the amount raised by this advance canvass will be made next Monday night, the opening night of the campaign.

Wednesday there will be a meeting of the committee, headed by T. W. McFarland, which is in charge of the canvass of the public utilities. The meeting will be held at 5 o'clock.

Thursday afternoon there will be a meeting of the committee in charge of the larger factories and places of business.

Towards the end of the week, there will be a meeting of the committee in charge of the canvass of offices and stores. This committee is composed of representatives from the Catholic clubs, the Sales and Advertising clubs, the Royal Order of Moose, and the Life Underwriters' Association.

Representatives of these organizations are V. T. Cogan, Geo. Clarke, Harry Kirby and H. E. Parsons.

J. H. Gundy of Toronto, and Dr. Horace Britton, of the citizens' research committee, will address gatherings of the canvassers on Monday and Tuesday evenings next, respectively.

These gatherings will take the form of banquets. George M. Reid and Philip Pocock having offered to provide dinners on these occasions.

It is possible that another dinner meeting will be held on Wednesday evening. On Saturday at the end of the campaign a noon luncheon of the travelers' organizations which are assisting in the work will be held.

HEAVY RAIN STORM ENDS RETURN TREK OF VETERANS

Ottawa, June 6.—The veterans' trek is ended. Three hours of hailing rain was sufficient to make them change their mind after another appeal by Murdock who arrived on the scene by motor at 2 o'clock. After a lengthy stay with General Riley he persuaded him that it would be in the best interest for the men to come into Ottawa and take the train to Toronto. A special of four coaches is being made up and is to leave at 9 o'clock via Canadian Pacific.

At 3 o'clock the hikers arrived at the Union Station glad to get out of the storm and headed for home.

Riley stated that they could not have gone very far without any food at all. Four men fell out in the five miles last night. On arrival in Toronto the men will march to Queen's Park and disperse.

It is proposed to acquire temporary clubrooms for them, where they will write up the grievances of the individual hikers, to be forwarded to Ottawa for government action.

"I am leaving now, but I am coming back with an army of thousands. After all we are real veterans. This G. W. V. A. and the G. A. U. V. are discredited, and it is up to us to go back to Toronto and organize only real veterans association in existence. We have been handed sandwiches. These sandwiches are the governments gratuity to the men," declared General Riley.
