The kids perched on the tin roof beat made more noise with their feet when the Terriers scored four in the first than the band.

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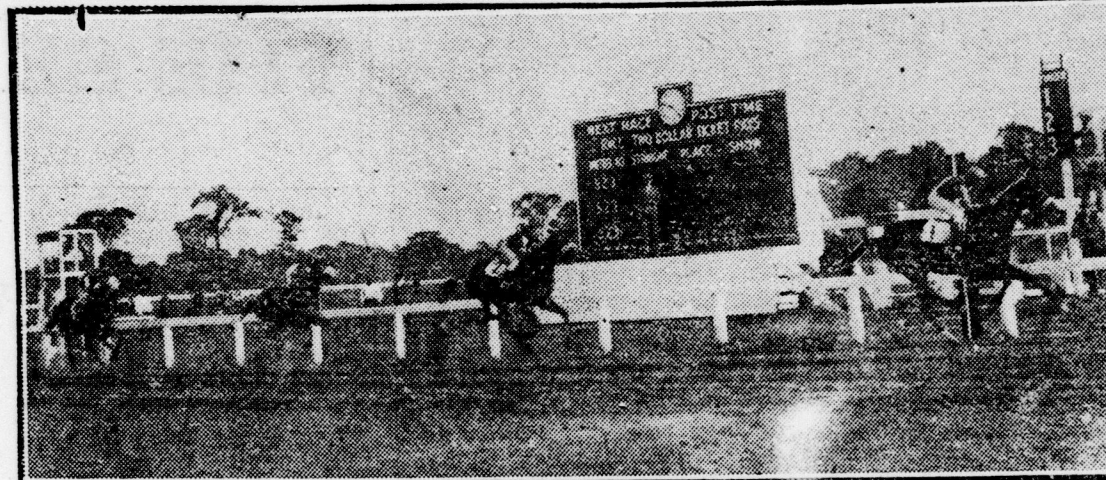
