## VANCOUVER.

## WESTMINSTER.

WESTMINSTER, March 8.—The steamer Leonora came over from Moodyville to-day and was disabled by a break in her machinery. The steamer Skidgate towed her back to the inlet.

J. Hemans, well known in cattle circles, came down from Ashcroft last night, and brings the latest trustworthy news regarding the losses sustained by the ranchers of the interior during the last six weeks.

While some ranchers have escaped with very trifling losses, having fed their cattle from the first appearance of winter, Mr. Hemans says the loss generally will be heavy, some losing as high as seventy per cent. of their herds.

He places the average loss at about twenty per cent. but of this a large proportion will be young animals; consequently, though the loss in numbers may be nearly one-third, the loss in value will be more than fifty per cent.

It is impossible, Mr. Hemans says, to get at the exact losses yet, but a month hence will tell the tale. The weather is again mild in the interior and cattle are being turned out to feed on the stubble.

## THE LATE COLONEL BERNARD.

A once important figure in the social, official and military life of the Capital has passed away, in the person of Lt.-Colonel Edwin Bernard, C.M.G., Q.C., for many years Minister of Justice of Canada, who expired in Montreal on Friday last.

The late Colonel Bernard was a son of the late Hon. Thomas James Bernard, a member of the Upper Canada Council, the Island of Jamaica, and the Province of Ontario, (the latter of whom died in Ottawa, 26th Feb., 1878, and is buried at Beechwood), and was born in Jamaica in 1823.

His father, the late Hon. James Patrick, Q.C., and being also associated with that estimable gentleman in the editorship of the "Upper Canada Law Journal," a publication established in the interests of the legal profession and of the municipalities, whose well merited eminence among similar publications on the continent it still maintains.

The talents and capabilities of the young practitioner having been brought by Mr. Patrick under the notice of his political chief, Sir John Macdonald, then for the first time at the head of public affairs, led to the appointment of Mr. Bernard as Private Secretary to the Prime Minister—thus opening an official connection of the pleasant kind which was to be preserved and strengthened in after years by a matrimonial union between the great Conservative leader and the Private Secretary, significantly named, the present Baroness Macdonald of Epsford.

In the following year, on the retirement of Chief Justice Harrison from the Civil Service to pursue his profession, Mr. Bernard succeeded him as Chief Clerk of the Crown Law Department, a position he retained until Confederation, when he became Deputy Minister of Justice, having, under his able and efficient, and experienced, and successful administration, the reputation of one of the ablest and most successful administrators of justice throughout the Dominion not specially entrusted to the several provinces. This office he resigned in October, 1878, to accept of a similar service, owing to continued ill-health. He was subsequently employed in 1878-9 as Assistant Commissioner with Sir Alexander Hall in negotiations with the Governments of France and Spain for commercial relations with Canada. In addition to his regular official work, Colonel Bernard was called upon to undertake various other duties, more especially in connection with the visit of the Prince of Wales and in respect to the subject of the Confederation of British America. He was the secretary to the conference of delegates which met at Quebec in the autumn of 1864, and also to the London conference of 1866-67, which determined the final terms of union; and in acknowledgment of his public services on these occasions received from Her Majesty the decoration of a C.M.G. At a later period he was appointed by the King of Belgium as a member of the Order of the Leopold. A man of high education and having received a thorough legal training, Colonel Bernard was, for many years, entrusted with the preparation of the many of the important of the public measures submitted by successive Administrations to Parliament, a duty he discharged with all his accustomed care and ability. He was an ardent supporter of the cause of the old Civil Service Rids Company, and upon the removal to Ottawa of the seat of government he took a leading part in organizing the splendid volunteer "regiment" bearing the same name which existed here for several years under the veteran command of the late Colonel Wily, and in which he himself held a major's rank. He was a member of the Vice-Regal staff at Rideau Hall, and at the time of his death was still an honorary A.D.C. to the Queen's representative. The deceased gentleman always manifested a warm interest in the welfare of the Capital. One of his first acts in 1865 after the removal of the Government here had been devoted to promoting the cause of looking to the organization of a social club of Quebec, of which he had been one of the founders, and which was a permanent and useful institution, which efforts resulted in the establishment of the Rideau Club, an institution whose present prosperity attests the wisdom and foresight of the founder. A number of names now living who were associated with Colonel Bernard in the undertaking and whose names appear in the act of incorporation may be mentioned: Hon. John Carling, Sir Hector Langevin, Sir Richard Cartwright, Hon. G. W. Allan, Sir John Abbott, Sir A. T. Gaff and Messrs. Valler, Shum, Alton, and others. John Ashworth, Allan Gilmour, William White, Sir C. S. Gossow, John Poirer and H. V. Noel. It remains but to add that during Colonel Bernard's extended career he was distinguished by active, courteous, unswerving industry, attention to the interests of the Government and a fairness and candour of mind which won for him the esteem and confidence of men from both political parties, a fact which was evidenced on his official retirement, on which occasion the then Prime Minister, Mr. Mackenzie, paid him the unwelcome compliment of proposing his health, a compliment given at the Rideau Club by a high legal personage, who has also passed from the scene, and in doing so, expressed not only his own regret, but that of the Government as a whole, over the withdrawal from official life of one to whom they were personally so much indebted and who had shown himself in every relation to the public so capable and worthy. Although for many years retired from the active duties of life, Colonel Bernard's death will be none the less sincerely mourned, not only by those to whom he was endeared by ties of kinship, but by surviving friends throughout the country.
