Prospectors About to Turn Cannibals When Found by

A blood curdling story of starvation and attempted cannibalism has been brought from Teller, says the Nome Gold Digger of July 24th.

Jack Huston and Joseph C. Thiery, with the remains of George Dean were found at 9 a. m. on Saturday morning, ten miles up the Aglapuk river in an old Indian igloo by Louis Reich and George Woods. Dean had been dead six hours, and his unhappy companions, who, for twenty-three days, had been slowly dying of starvation, were preparing a stew of fiesh cut from his thigh.

Providentially the arrival of their rescuers saved the famished men from making their grewsome repast. An odd looking boat by the river side first attracted the attention of Reich and Woods, and when they went nearer, they heard the unfortunate men in a weak voice crying to them for God sake to come into the igloo and rescue them.

A repulsive sight met the eyes of the two men when they entered. Huston and Thiery, two living skeletons, moved feebly beside the corpse of their emaciated partner, from whose thigh a slice had been cut by the two men who had been driven to choose between death and cannibalism. Quickly the repulsive meal was thrown away, and the famished men were fed with gruel and tenderly taken to Teller in a boat tiong with their dead companion by their rescuers.

Huston was in the last stages of emaciation, and could not have lived many hours longer without nourishment. J. C. Thiery has a more robust constitution and was able to talk to his rescuers. It seems that the three men started for Teller from Quartz creek, heading for Burk creek in the middle of June. They found Burk full of water and decided to stick to the divide, following it down to the Arlapuk. Then they lost their way in the vicinity of Salt Lake and floundered hopelessly through sloughs and marshes, but they stuck it bravely out till they got to the igloo on the Aglapuk.

By this time their provisions had long been exhausted, and they were slowly famishing. They tried to make a boat to cross their way in the their the attention of their rescuers.
