WILL ERECT SHIP-BUILDING PLANT

McLennan Foundry & Machine Works Give Notice of Intention to Build Wharf

The McLennan Foundry & Machine Works are advertising in another column a notice stating that that company will after one month apply to the Governor-in-Council for permission to build certain wharves in the Restigouche River in the Town of Campbellton.

This is the preliminary notice for the erection of a shipbuilding plant here. The Graphic understands that The McLennan Foundry & Machine Works have acquired the Duncan Point property adjoining their present plant and will use it for shipbuilding.

SEA TANK NEW ENGINE OF WAR

Italians Adapt Idea of Land Tank to Curious Craft Which Raided Pola.

London, June 10.—"According to Vienna news received here," says the Central News correspondent at Amsterdam, "the Italians used a 'sea tank' during the last attack at Pola, Austria's naval base on the Adriatic. The boat was forty feet long, six feet wide, and propelled by electricity."

"There is an endless rotary chain around the vessel fitted with bars which cut nets and other obstacles, like the land tank. The vessel has two torpedo tubes."

Airmen Do Part.

Rome, June 10.—Five hostile airplanes were brought down and four tons of bombs were dropped on the enemy's depots and communication junction, according to the official statement issued by the war office today.

The text reads: "Artillery duels were frequent from Tonelle to the Brenta river and on the lower Piave. In Val Laugarina, Val Arsa and at Sbonche and Port Di Salton, enemy surprise attacks by large detachments were frustrated."

INSPECTOR MANN AT MONCTON.
Rev. W. D. Wilson, Chief Prohibition Inspector for New Brunswick, is busy engaged preparing the way for the operation of prohibition in Westmorland.

Inspector Mann of Campbellton has arrived in the county and will have charge of the operations of the law until an inspector has been appointed.

Rev. Mr. Wilson and Inspector Mann went to Shediac yesterday morning and proceeded to Sackville and Dorchester in the afternoon.—Moncton Times.

S. A. COMMISSIONER TO SPEAK HERE

Will Conduct Meeting in The Opera House Sunday Afternoon at 3 O'clock.

Commissioner W. J. Richards, Territorial leader of the Salvation Army of Canada, arrives in Campbellton on Saturday's limited, and will conduct a series of meetings here on Saturday and Sunday, June 15th and 16th. The meetings on Saturday and Sunday morning will be held in the S. A. Citadel.

JAS. E. FRIEL IS COMMISSIONER

Fredericton, June 9.—James S. Friel K. C. of Moncton, was selected by the local government on Friday last as the royal commissioner to hear the evidence and report upon the charges made against Hon. William Currie, M. P. P., of Restigouche, speaker of the Legislature.

These charges were made toward the end of the session by J. R. M. Baxter, M. P. P., and were based upon an affidavit by a man who formerly was a government sealer. The premier at that time read affidavits by Mr. Currie and the president of the lumber company of which Mr. Currie is manager denying the accusations in toto. Hon. Mr. Foster announced that a complete investigation would be made under oath, and the appointment of Mr. Friel to hear the evidence and report upon it is the result.

Mr. Friel is one of the best known of New Brunswick's barristers, a man of keen legal ability and long experience, and it is felt that in his hands the charges will be probed to the bottom.

VENUS COTE NOT JAILED FOR WEARING MEN'S CLOTHES
Kingston, Ont., June 11.—It transpires that the Cote Woman, popularly known as "Venus" Cote, is not serving two years in Portsmouth penitentiary for wearing male attire, as was first reported. The story was that she was sent to the penitentiary for two years for posing as a man while working as a log-driver on the Restigouche River, and, on the strength of this, application has been made to the department of justice for her release.

The facts of the case are that the woman was sent up for five years for theft, she having broken into a house and stolen a quantity of silverware, clothing, etc. In addition, she broke jail after her arrest, and was not captured for several days. At present she is confined at the women's prison at the penitentiary, and seems to be very quiet, for one of her peculiar disposition. She will be taught to sew and do other feminine work, but at the present time she scarcely knows what a thimble is for.

RESTRICTION EVEN ON LAVISH PURCHASE OF ESSENTIAL GOODS
Ottawa, June 10.—The Citizen, today, says: "Unless Canadians are prepared, voluntarily, to reduce their expenditures abroad for luxuries and such articles as wearing apparel or expensive boots and shoes, the government may be compelled, it is semi-officially intimated, to extend the list of articles which may be imported only under license."

"Even essentials should not be imported in unnecessarily large quantities. Purchases of non-essentials abroad can be paid for only by exportation of gold. This the minister of finance can prevent under the authority of an order-in-council recently passed."

"The danger of purchasing non-essentials and excessive quantities of other goods lies in the fact that failing export of gold, exchange will to that extent, be penalized. Furthermore the cost of production of manufacture in the articles required for war and other necessary national resources may be included."

NO SPECIAL PERMIT FOR FOOD AT PICNIC PARTIES.
Ottawa, June 11.—The Canadian food board has received a great number of enquiries relative to the food regulations applying to picnics, garden parties, lawn socials, etc. Special permits to serve food contrary to the regulations are being asked for but such permits will not be given.

Henry B. Thompson, chairman of the food board, stated today that enactment of the regulations was prompted by the need of saving wheat, meat, fat and sugar, and that any little discomfort to which the picnicker, or other person patronizing a function of this kind, may be put is negligible in the face of the stern necessity of war conditions.

Registrars Appointed and Any Person May Register at Once.

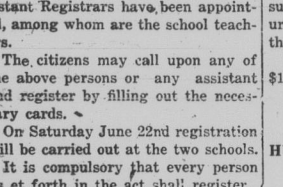
Registration under the act which says that all persons, male or female between the ages of 16 years and 60 years must register is now going on throughout Restigouche and other sections of the province and dominion.

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HUNS WANTED TO KNOW WHEN U.S. TROOPS LANDED
London, June 10.—How the captors of three American soldiers on the sector northwest of Chateau Thierry unwittingly led them back into the Allied lines, owing to the tangled condition of the fighting front there, is told by the correspondent of the Times with the American army in France.

Corp. Sidney Rogers and Ptes. Raymond Howard and Frank P. Hildway were captured at Hill 204. The Germans started with them to the rear, but became confused and walked straight into the French lines and themselves were taken prisoner.

The Americans reported that German officers had questioned them closely as to when and where they had landed in Europe, where they were trained and the identity of their units. The Americans refused to answer any of the questions. The Germans served the American prisoners with a nauseating compound of flour and water as food.

NEW BRITISH PLANES AMAZING MONSTERS

Possess Great Destructive Capacity—Airmen for Reprisals.

London, June 10.—At the invitation of the British authorities I made a flight Saturday afternoon in one of the new monster British airplanes. The flight was more like a parlor car than an ordinary air trip. The smoothness of running and steadiness of the new planes was amazing. They possess great destructive capacity. I found the Canadians occupying an ever bigger place in the British air service. "They now form easily one-half of our new recruits," one leader told me. "I've just come from a big air centre, where practically every man is a Canadian."

Among British airmen there is no question concerning the desirability of reprisals upon Boche towns. They're wholeheartedly for it. They have the machine to enable them to punish Germany manifold heavier than she can hope to injure us.

INCREASED GARDEN ACREAGE.
Mr. F. Abraham, Honorary Chairman of the Vacant Lot and Home Garden Section of the Canada Food Board, estimates an increased garden acreage of at least 200% over that of last year. Great efforts will have to be made to can, dry and store the surplus crop.

EASTERLY STORM DOES MUCH DAMAGE

Fishermen are Heavy Losers in Gale Which Wrecked Nets and Boats.

An easterly storm, beginning at an early hour Wednesday morning and continuing all day did great damage amongst the fishermen in the Bay Chaleur. It is said this is the worst June storm in twenty-five years.

The coast between Dalhousie and Bathurst has suffered greatly. Salmon nets and lobster traps have been washed ashore and destroyed, and other equipment damaged. During Wednesday night a violent electrical storm raged and rain fell in torrents.

BORDEN ATTENDS IMPOSING SERVICE

Lord Mayor and Canadian Representatives Take Part.

The Montreal Star Office, 20 Cockspur Street, London, June 10.—Premier Sir Robert Borden made his first public appearance at the commemorative service at Saint Columba's Church of Scotland, West London, yesterday. It was an imposing civic and military ceremony, in which the Lord Mayor, Overseas Premiers, General and Lady Turner, Generals Hogarth and Ross, Sir George Foster, Lady Strathcona, Rev. Dr. Johnston and many other representatives from Canada took part. Chaplain-Director Beattie read one of the lessons while an Australian chaplain read the other.

Premier Borden and Hon. N. W. Rowell received cordial greetings before the service, from Lord Mayor Hanson and the Rev. Dr. Archibald Fleming. The sermon paid striking tribute to the Dominion: "We will offer of her sons and daughters, and the matchless courage of the Canadian and other overseas troops, ending: 'We go back to our tasks, grim, bloody and awful though they be. In this earthly house of prayer, we may never meet again, but we have here laid bare our purpose before God. Now we go forth with new pride in our mission, a new confidence in our Master, to make war against war, that war may be no more.'

The pipers of the Scots Guards closed the service with the lament, the Guards bugler sounding the Last Post.

Thousands of Londoners thronged the streets. Premier Borden and Hon. Rowell, accompanied by General Turner, the Lord Chancellor and Capt. Swinton, inspected the Canadian troops, who afterwards marched along the street through Piccadilly with the pipers of the Toronto Highlanders at their head.

NEARLY 1,000 CASUALTIES IN HOSPITALS BOMBED

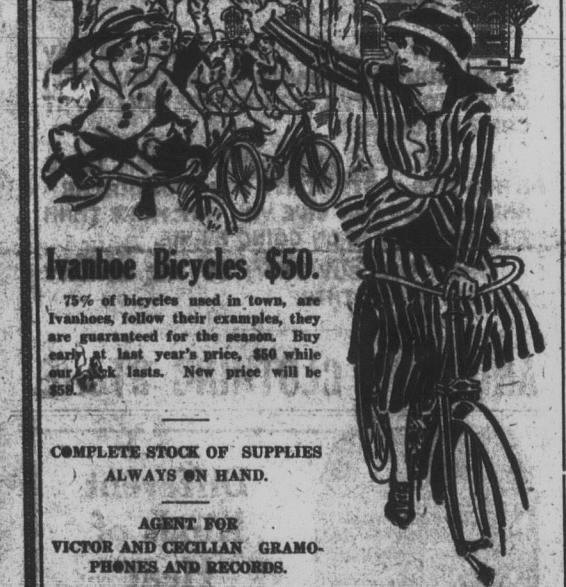
London, June 10.—Germans bombed British hospitals in France seven times between May 15 and June 1, according to a statement made in the House of Commons by J. I. Macpherson, under-secretary of the war office. The casualties number 991.

Officers, 11; other ranks, 218; nursing sisters, 5; women's auxiliary corps, 8; civilians, 6.
