It fits on the walls like the lid of a tempot; or, as the architects, Messra. Kennedy & Holland, express the idea, it is like a large umbrells without a handle. All the lumber that is used is treated with a composition of silicate. to keep out the mois-ture and to make it fire proof. Hundreds of lands of earth have been carted linto the building; quantities of lumber, trees both living and dead, together with a collection of fence ralls, bushes, sods, logs, sand and a variety of camp equipage are piled about ready for use. The platforms are the groundwork for the earth and sod, which are very skilfully joined to their painted semb-lances on the canvas; bushes and trees are planted; earthworks and log camps are built; everything is done with caroful intent to make the foreground and painting, appear as one
