LONDON'S NEW TOWER BRIDGE A HOLIDAY OUTING. to Be Opened By the Prince of Wales The Queen's Royal Program For the

London, June 29.—London's new tower bridge, which will be opened to-morrow by the Prince of Wales, is near the famous old Tower of London and connects Bermondsey, Walworth, Camberwell and Peckham on the south banks of the Thames, with the western part of the old city on the north bank. According to the Lord Mayor of London, the bridge has cost the city over £1,000,000. The bridge was begun in 1886.

From 500 to 800 men have since been constantly employed on it. Seven men have been killed since its construction was begun.

FOUND A GAS JET BURNING

AN ENQUIRY INTO THE ORIGIN OF THE PRITTIE FIRE.

oroner Johnson Opens An Inquest-Evidence of the Man Who First Saw the Blaze and Pulled the Alarm-Firemen Describe the Burned Portions of the House.

An inquest was held in the Court House, Court-street, last night by Coroner A. J. Johnson to inquire into the origin of the ire which destroyed the house of R. W. Prittie, Shannon-street and Dovercourt-

oad, May 14 last. Mr. George Mackenzie, 50 Dewson-street, stated that while walking down Concord-avenue on the morning of May 14 he saw moke issuing from under the eaves, on the east side of Mr. Prittie's house. Noticing an electric light tie's house. Noticing an electric light man running across the commons towards the house, he pulled the alarm at Collegatreet and Ossington-avenue. He then went back to the house and saw flames issuing from the windows on the first floor of the east side, immediately below where he first noticed the smoke. Smoke was also issuing from the windows and doors on west side of house.

In answer to questions of a young man he said he thought the Ossington-avenue firemen were a long while in reaching the scene of the fire.

Saw Mr. Prittle's Son There.

He saw Mr. Prittie's son standing at the corner of the fence yelling "Fire!" None lived in the house at the time. lived in the house at the time.

The fact of smoke issuing from the upper and lower stories at the same time would indicate that both stories were burning at the one time. He also saw a woman in its yard wearing an apron, but no hat. She informed the firemen that valuable papers were in the south room of the building and tried to induce them to save the papers. No person seemed to know this woman. The papers, however, were not saved.

Found a Gas Jet Burning, J. Irwin, fireman at Dundas-street Hose Station, was next called. They reached the fire about five minutes after the alarm was struck. They worked at the south side of the building and played streams through the windows. When they had checked the fire sufficiently they went inside and found the gas jet burning. They then went up the ladder to the upper story and found the whole inside of the building ablaze. The fire was mostly in the partitions. The front rooms of the house were also burning fiercely. The doors were open, but might have been burnt open. Went right through the house and found most of the fire in the centre of the building, from the ground floor up. The attic was also burning in spots.
