THE CITY'S CASE AGAINST THE GAS COMPANY

When the street car franchise was up for settlement every alderman, every newspaper had a great deal to say about it. The best legal talent to be had was engaged to look after the city's interest, to draft the agreement and to watch the companies that were about to make an offer. The result was fairly good, but the city was better than had ever before been gotten by any city of similar size.

Now quite as valuable a franchise is up for adjustment in the Gas Company's monopoly. But for one reason or other the press are mostly dumb. The World is fighting the monopoly singlehanded. We have been at great expense and trouble to elucidate the value to the city of Judge Ferguson's decree. We have tried to show that the Gas Company is bound by that decree to refund over a million and a half of dollars to the consumers. We have shown that, in disobeying the law and its acts of incorporation, the company is liable to have its charter and monopoly cancelled. We have shown that a most ingenious clause was quietly got through the Legislature, giving the franchise a value to the company which it had no right to have. And we have had more than reason for suspecting that the company was trying to improperly influence aldermen.

But if the press and aldermen are slow to appreciate the situation, the great body of consumers are not, if we may judge of the reception accorded The World's special articles on the subject.

The World now insists that the city proceed in the same way as it did in regard to the street car franchise. Let the best legal talent be especially engaged on the case—Mr. Christopher Robinson, for instance, who represented the city in the proceedings before Judge Ferguson. Let him prepare a report to the city embodying and elucidating the actual points secured to the city in the decree. Let him advise the council as to the liability of the company for its non-fulfilment of its acts of incorporation, and what the city could fairly ask from the legislature in the way of a remedy. Let there be no delay in this; and in the meantime, until such report is made and advice got by the council, let there be no more negotiations with a corporation that refuses to admit that it is in the wrong and offers no restoration for its illegal acts.

CANADA AND A FAST ATLANTIC SERVICE

It will require some little time for the people of Canada to fully realize the importance to this country of the establishment of the proposed fast Atlantic service. Such a service will not only beneficially affect Canada locally, but it will be the means of diverting a large volume of the passenger traffic between Europe and Asia that now goes by way of the Suez canal. The citation of a few figures of time and distance will enable the reader to see that we are on the eve of changes of immense importance to this country.

The distance from Toronto to Liverpool by way of the St. Lawrence is exactly the same as the distance from New York to Liverpool. The distance from Toronto to Rimouski is 80 miles. If two ships left Liverpool at the same hour, the one via St. Lawrence and the other to New York, the latter would be 80 miles out at sea when the former had reached Rimouski. Assuming that an express train would travel 40 miles an hour, or double the rate of a fast Atlantic steamer, a passenger coming to Toronto would reach this city 17 hours before a passenger coming by the other ship would reach New York. That is to say, when the new line is established Toronto will be nearer Liverpool than New York by 17 hours. Not only will we make the journey in a shorter time, but one-fifth of the route will be over land. Most passengers will heartily appreciate a route which would shorten the ocean voyage even by a single day.

The distance from Rimouski to Chicago is 1180 miles. An express train at 40 miles an hour would cover the distance in 30 hours, or four hours sooner

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COMMERCIAL NEWS.

Toronto Railway stock is still on tap, with sales on Saturday at 77 3/4, a decline of 3 per cent for the week.

The discussions over the Consumers' Trust relative to the must be charged consumers have brought to light the large earning capacity of the company and created a demand for stock, which has risen during the week from 197 to 198 1/2.

There has been a decline in the price of Canadian Pacific in spite of exceptional large earnings. It closed on Saturday at 56 3/4, as against sales early in the week at 54 1/2, a pretty good price for a non-dividend payer but prospects are that dividends will be resumed in the spring.

There is another decline in the price of Ontario when the stock market buyers along the Northern on Saturday to pay the farmer only 65c for white and 60c for red winter.
