MONTREAL, Nov. 11.—According to Sam Davidson, secretary of the Domonion Football Association, who arrived in Montreal this morning from New York, where he spoke with the United States Football Association of ficials concerning subjects of mutual interest to Canada and the United States, "everything looks good" for an international football league, which will bring in New York, Brooklyn, Boston, New Bedford with two Montreal clubs, two Toronto clubs and possibly one from Detroit.

MONTREAL. Nov. 11. — Georges Vezina, veteran goalkeeper of the Canadiens, is practically certain to start the season with his old team when they open here against Pittsburg on November 28. For a time the Canadien management thought that they might have some difficulty in again lining up the veteran from Chicoutimi. but a telegram from Vezina to Leo Dandurand this evening practically assured the local management of their chances of again having him this year.

In any case, the Canadien officials are prepared. They have made an offer to Lacroix, who played goal for the United States Olympic team last year at Chamoniox. Lacroix will arrive in Montreal to-morrow morning for a tryout. Aurel Joliat, flashy left wing of the league champions, reported to the club's offices to-night, and will practice with the team to-morrow.

Manager Dandurand has sent a telegram to Gerald Carson in Grimsby, giving the former amateur until Saturday to report, after which he will be placed on the suspension list. Dandurand signed Carson last winter, but allowed him to remain in amateur hockey for one season.

Gaudreault has had good senior amateur experience with Sons of Ireland, of Quebec, and with the bank team here last year. Cormier is a young player. Rene Fournier, Montreal amateur, who played last year in London, Ont., is working out with Canadiens on trial. The club has two players for each position at the workouts, which is already leading to the men showing their very best in an effort to make good their positions on the team.

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
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
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


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
