Westervelts and Falcons Play One-All Tie In Get-Away Night In Junior Hockey Association Before 500 Spectators At Arena

Three keenly contested and exciting contests were turned in at the opening of the London Junior City Hockey League at the London Arena last evening before a crowd of 500 spectators. Fifty-four junior players competed in the games and Coach William Marsden will have plenty of material from which to select London's Junior O. H. A. team.

Turn Deaf Ear To U.S. Proposal

Fort William and Port Arthur Hockey Clubs To Stick To C. A. H. A.

PORT ARTHUR, Nov. 11. — Port Arthur and Fort William hockey officials and players were in conference here to-day to review the conditions bearing upon the invitation which they have been considering for some days of entering the International Hockey League with Duluth, Eveleth, Hibbing, Minneapolis, St. Paul and Marquette. The invitation had come following announcement that Sault Ste. Marie and Pittsburgh were dropping out of the proposed circuit. This made it very compact and therefore attractive.

Word was received, however, that both the Soo and Pittsburgh intended to continue in the United States circuit and there also remained the uncertainty of what a jump from organized amateur hockey to the professional ranks would mean. The ultimate decision was, therefore, that if developments in Manitoba this week should be as expected the invitation to link up with the international circuit will be declined.

The report from Manitoba is that two strong Winnipeg teams will be invited to the senior series with Kenora, Port Arthur and Fort William, of the Thunder Bay League. As soon as this eventuates the decision on the part of Port Arthur and Fort William will be made final.

All the players of both Port Arthur and Fort William teams agreed to stick with their clubs in whichever circuit was ultimately chosen. One of the considerations for the Port Arthur players was the trip to Eastern Ontario in December, on which it is expected to play in Windsor, Stratford and Niagara Falls and Toronto, the last named to be an S. F. A. game. The players are eager to make this trip. Furthermore they believe that they can hold the Allan cup for another year and would like to see the select circle of clubs which have had the coveted trophy two years in succession.

DANDURAND WANTS GERALD CARSON, TOO
MONTREAL, Nov. 11. — Georges Vezina, veteran goaltender of the Canadiens, is practically certain to start the season with his old team when they open here against Pittsburgh on November 28. For a time the Canadian management thought that they might have some difficulty in again lining up the veteran from Chicoutimi, but a telegram from Vezina to Leo Dandurand this evening practically assured the local management of their chances of again having him this year.

Some, it is expected, will hardly make the grade this year, while others are certain to be offered contracts if they continue to show the form of last season, and that which they showed in the first workout to-day at the Mount Royal Arena. Pete Letue, who played for Banque Canadienne Nationale last season, has already been signed by Canadiens. His team mates of last season, Gaudreault and Cormier, left and right wing men, respectively, are also trying out. Gaudreault has had good senior amateur experience with Sons of Ireland, of last year. Cormier is a young player, who played last year in London, Ont., working out with Canadiens on trial.

The club has two players for each position at the workouts, which is already leading to the men showing their best in an effort to make good their positions on the team.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Nov. 11. — Tommy Milton won the Armitage 250-mile automobile race here to-day. Harry Hartz finished second, about three-fourths of a lap behind Milton. Charles Wonderlich came in third and Norman Batten, fourth. Milton's time was announced at 2:04.41, an average of 124.3 miles an hour, a new track record.
