Amount Secured Reduces Debt On Rink to \$200.—Details on Receipts and Expenditures.

The management of the Rink wish to take this opportunity of thanking all who gave of their time and assistance, and to all who donated, and in many ways so generously responded when called upon, also to the Bridgetown Band and members of Annapolis and Lawrencetown Bands.

The management feel, however, that particular recognition should be given to the work done by Mrs. E. L. Fisher, who really was the first to propose the idea, and who was the moving spirit throughout.

The public will be pleased to learn that the indebtedness of the Rink is now reduced to \$2,000, and it is now expected to reduce this considerably each year until the full amount is liquidated.
