IN THE WORK TOWARDS A PLAN TO GOVERN THE TARIFF SIDE

OF THESE COMPLEX NEGOTIATIONS THE CANADIAN DELEGATION IS

PRESSING TO ENSURE THAT THERE IS SCOPE FOR NEGOTIATING DUTY
FREE ENTRY ON PRODUCTS CURRENTLY SUBJECT TO LOW RATES OF DUTY

IN FOREIGN MARKETS. THIS OBJECTIVE IS PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT

FOR CANADA IN RESPECT OF OUR EXPORT INTERESTS IN RESOURCE-BASED

SECTORS, BUT ALSO HAS APPLICATION ELSEWHERE. THE CANADIAN

DELEGATION CONTINUES TO ARGUE STRONGLY ALSO FOR A NEGOTIATING

FRAMEWORK IN WHICH TRADE IN CERTAIN RESOURCE-BASED SECTORS

COULD BE ADDRESSED IN A COMPREHENSIVE AND CO-ORDINATED WAY, TO

PERMIT NEGOTIATIONS ON ALL TRADE BARRIER CONSTRAINTS TO

INCREASED PROCESSING OF SUCH CANADIAN RESOURCES INSIDE CANADA AND TO

PROVIDE FOR GREATER AND MORE SECURE LIBERALIZATION OF TRADE IN

THESE SECTORS THAN MIGHT OTHERWISE BE POSSIBLE IN THE NEGOTIATIONS.

WHATEVER TARIFF PLAN MAY BE AGREED WILL, I BELIEVE, ALSO
BE LINKED TO PROGRESS IN OTHER AREAS OF THE MTN, ESPECIALLY
AGRICULTURE AND SOME OF THE NON-TARIFF MEASURES I HAVE MENTIONED.
AS YOU KNOW, WORK IN GENEVA IS PROCEEDING ON THE ELABORATION OF DRAFT
CODES OF CONDUCT ON GOVERNMENT PROCUREMENT PRACTICES, TECHNICAL
BARRIERS TO TRADE AND SUBSIDIES AND COUNTERVAILING DUTIES.
THE IMMEDIATE OBJECTIVE IN THESE AREAS IS TO TABLE WELL-ADVANCED
