PUBLICATION OF ROBERTSON INQUIRY REPORT -ASSISTANCE TO INDUSTRY

Mr. Thomas M. Bell (Saint John-Lancaster): I have a question for the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce. Has the government received the report of the Robertson inquiry into a long-term maritime policy for Canada and, if so, what will be done with the report? Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): I received the report, which is 600 pages long, last Tuesday. The committee presented it to the Canadian Shipbuilding and Ship Repairing Association the next day. This is a report of the committee and the committee is free to do what it wants with it. I understand that copies are now available or will be made available soon to the Parliamentary Library.

Mr. Bell: In view of the statement made yesterday by the chairman of the Canadian Shipbuilding and Ship Repairing Association of Canada that this industry has had its worst year since 1940, will the minister do everything he can to hurry some relief to the industry?

Mr. Pepin: Yes, indeed, Mr. Speaker, but I think if my hon. friend reads the 600-page report he will realize very soon that one of the major facts that comes out of the report is that the committee while making important suggestions, does not disagree with the fundamental position taken by the government in respect of shipbuilding, specially with respect to subsidies.
