precluded no future disputes-that very war, I repeat, he now found himfelf obliged, not for his country but himfelf, to provoke and accelerate under every additional circumstance of difadvantage. His armaments accordingly were redoubled after the exchange of the Declara-It was then that he began to prefs his tions. other points with a degree of pertinacity perfectly inconfistent with his former forbearance. In this extremity France could no longer remain neuter. The eyes of the National Affembly, as well as of the country at large, began to open upon this conduct. They faw, or imagined they faw,-and never furely did the behaviour of an English Minister fo much warrant the conclusion, -purpofes very different, and infinitely more extensive, gradually develope themselves in his proceedings. They remembered, but gloried in remembering, their own conduct in regard to America, and fancied the moment of their diftractions prefented an opportunity to retaliate, which those who guided the British counfels would fcarcely mifs: that the attack meditated against Spain, was but the commencement of a plan, the object of which was the commerce, the colonies, and the maritime power of their own country: that when Spain had fallen, as fall she muft, if fingle and unfupported in fuch a conteft,
