Medical Health Officer Says That "Appreciation of Honest Service Has Become Impossible to Certain Influences Existent."

### LEAVES WHEN HOSPITAL ENQUIRY IS CONCLUDED

For the second time within six months Dr. Charles Sheard has resigned as medical health officer of the City of Toronto. He sent a letter of resignation to Mayor Geary yesterday af-ternoon. The mayor and Controller Spence were out of town and the other controllers, who happened to be hold-ing a meeting, sent the communication on to the council, who will discuss it on Monday next.

on Monday next.

While the doctor's course is a general surprise, it is known that within the last short while he has to friends expressed his regret at having reentered the service after his resignation of March 29 last, which went into effect May 1. The inability of the council to agree on any one of the nominees to fill the vacancy, which included Drs. Amyot, Goodchild, Hastings and A. R. Pyne, resulted in a compromise vote in June to reappoint Dr. Sheard at an advance in salary of \$1000 a year—making \$6000—while at the same time he was relieved of the burden of looking after the street-

the same time he was relieved of the burden of looking after the street-cleaning department.

While the first resignation was a simple request to be relieved of his duties, his message yesterday is from a pen that seems to have been dipped in gall. His reference to "the many disappointed cliques and influences existent, some of whom assume to voice public opinion," is plainly connected with the repeated attacks on the quality of the water being supplied the city. Whether the judicial enquiry now under way into the management of the Isolation Hospital, as regards safeguarding patients from cross-infection has influenced his action, is not indicated, except that his resignation is to take effect when that investigation is endedfi Dr. Sheard's usual modesty is abandoned, for he mentions as necessary qualifications for a successor "mental and physical vigor, independence and a universal knowledge." There appeared to be a fear that Windsor might sell her surplus power at a profit for her own benefit, and the resolution was framed to block that possibility. It became evident at an early stage

The effect of the resolution would naturally be, should Windsor proceed with the exploitation of power, to encourage the city in the development of local consumption of the power, and hasten its return from Detroit, where it is expected the surplus will be ex-
