U.S. SENATE KILLS WILSON'S PEACE RATIFICATION BILL

URGENT IMMEDIATE ACTION BY STATES AND CANADA TO DEEPEN WATERWAYS

Sir Adam Beck Goes to Washington Tomorrow in Connection With Power Development on the St. Lawrence Waterways Association Appoint Officers

Special to The Toronto World, Windsor, Nov. 19.—Addresses by Sir Adam Beck, Hon. Sidney Storey, board of commerce, and George E. Hooker, of the United States, addressed commission members at the second day's program of the Canadian Deep Waterways and Power Association in inauguration convention in Windsor.

According to the constitution adopted: "One of the objects of this association shall be to act in conjunction with and co-operate with the Great Lakes, St. Lawrence Tide Water Association and any other like organization having similar objects in carrying on the work that is most urgent and most essential to this part of the country; the opening up of the natural waterways from their head to the tide waters on the St. Lawrence river and to facilitate and cheapen transportation and power development."

The resolution was prepared by a committee including E. L. Cousins and Major A. C. Lewis of the Toronto harbor commission, W. M. Stewart, M.L.A., of Welland; O. E. Fleming, K.C., and E. S. Little, London, Ont.

The officers named by the resolution will be: President, Sir Adam Beck; Vice-President, W. M. Stewart; Secretary, O. E. Fleming; Treasurer, E. S. Little; and Executive Committee, E. L. Cousins, Major A. C. Lewis, W. M. Stewart, O. E. Fleming, E. S. Little, and H. H. Williams.

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PEACE PACT RATIFICATION ATTEMPT IS FOILED BY U.S. SENATE

BOLSHEVIKI FOMENTING TROUBLE IN AFGHANISTAN AND TURKESTAN. Emissaries Trained and Taught Various Languages at Capital of Russian Turkestan Government.

London, Nov. 19.—The British authorities have received disturbing reports of Bolshevik activities in Turkestan and Afghanistan. Tashkent, capital of the government of Russian Turkestan, is the centre for classes of instruction, where Bolshevik emissaries are trained and taught various languages before undertaking missions farther east.

Washington, Nov. 19.—After three ineffectual attempts to ratify the peace treaty had failed, the senate late tonight gave up the attempt and laid the treaty aside.
