SERIOUS RESULT OF A KICK

Mr. Howell Before the Account Committee—Business in the Railway Committee—News
 Ottawa, May 26.—(Special).—Mr. H. M. Howell of Winnipeg, appeared before the Public Accounts Committee of the House of Commons this morning. Sir Herbert Tupper took the witness stand in the proceedings connected with the installation and prosecution of the ballot box cases in Manitoba, known as the Macdonald election frauds.

Howell said his account had been paid in full by Mr. Sifton in March, '97, and he did not know of the objections of the Minister of Justice. Its amount until recently.
