Washington, Nov. 9.—Bishop Henry C. Potter of New York testified to-day before the Industrial Commission. He spoke on sweatshops, arbitration and other questions. He saids he had more condidence in voluntary organizations to meet evilg that grew out of the sweatshop systems than in legislation. He alvocated a permanent committee to mediate between capitalists and labor organizations. He was disinclined to favor compulsory arbitration. With reference to the recent anthracite coal strike, the Bishop was asked for his remedy for differences where semployers absolutely refet every attempt at mediation with employee, especially where the public at large tions incident to the dispute.
