METROPOLITAN'S NEW PASTOR

Rev. William Sparling Enters Upon His Duties—He is an Attractive Preacher. Rev. William Sparling commenced his pastorate of the Metropolitan Church yesterday. His sermons at both the morning and evening services were clear, earnest discourses, and were attentively listened to by large congregations. Mr. Sparling has a splendid delivery, an easy, fluent diction and a powerful, resonant voice. His sermon last night was an exhortation to his hearers to lead a Christian life. An abnormal or unnatural life, he declared, was a life without Christ. God had constructed man so that it would be easy for him to do right and hard to do wrong. This, Mr. Sparling said, might be doubted, but if one carefully thought it over, he would see that it was so. If a person found it easier to do wrong than right, then that person had destroyed the bones of his moral sensibilities. True happiness, the preacher maintained, depended not upon what one might or might not have, but upon a Christian character. The source of a great deal of unhappiness was not because one did not have enough to eat and wear, but because some had not as much as others, and were just killing themselves fretting about it. Happiness, the preacher concluded, depended upon a person's reconstruction of life was out of harmony with God. Mr. Sparling also made appropriate, patristic references to Dominion Day, and after the services the national anthem and suitable hymns were sung.

FOUR MEN BADLY INJURED.

SKAGUAY'S FLAG INCIDENT.

Nothing Official is Known of It at Ottawa—Came Thru United States Sources.

Ottawa, June 28.—Regarding the story, which comes from Vancouver, saying that American citizens of Skaguay had insulted the British flag by tearing it down from the Canadian Customs House there, the Government has no official information. Neither the Secretary of State nor Mr. Macdonnell, Customs Commissioner, have any word of the occurrence. The committee with a view to the incident, that port not being a customs port. WASHINGTON, June 28.—The State Department has not received any representation concerning the flag incident at Skaguay, where much excitement is said to have been caused by the hauling down of a British customs flag, lowered at that point. Based on the press reports of the affair, the officials do not attach serious importance to the incident itself, although it is recognized that the matter might assume importance if the raising of the flag was an assertion of British sovereignty in that locality. In that event there is no doubt that the State Department would take cognizance of the matter, but as it stands the flag appears to be that of the customs, the convenience of designating there customs may be paid and not the British emblem, indicating any claim of sovereignty.

IMPERIAL STATE ROBE ON SALE.

Garment of the Empress Dowager of China on Exhibition in London.

London, June 28.—The princely riches untarshed by the hands of the imperial state robe of the Empress Dowager of China hangs in the window of a Fen. church-street tailor shop awaiting a buyer possessed of 500 guineas (\$2500). The robe is a magnificent creation of five years' old, astrachan sable and broadened silk, trim with solid gold lace and buttons. It has a long cape and train of royal ermine. The shopkeeper who offers the imperial garment, says that it was presented to a prominent China merchant in London by Sir Claude Macdonald, British Minister in Peking, and that it was intended for the Empress Dowager. He is prepared to guarantee that it once hung in 'Zoo-Hal's' wardrobe at Peking.

ITALIAN SENATORS HEATED.

Discussion Becomes So Violent That the Session Has to Be Suspended.

Rome, June 28.—The debate in the Chamber of Deputies today on the conflict at Ferrara, June 27, between agricultural strikers and soldiers, some of the fiercest being held, because so suggestive of that the president was obliged to suspend the sitting. Signor Giolitti, the Minister of the Interior, replying to an interpellation on the subject, said he regretted the incident, which was due to the introduction of foreign labor for harvesting. The government was especially strong, but when the advice was not heeded, it was obliged to safeguard the liberty of work. The strikers attacked the troops and the wounded a score. Signor Giolitti asked if it was true that the officers in command were drunk. The Minister of War, Gen. Count San Martino, repudiated the charge, and a violent exchange of recriminations followed and ended with the suspension of the session. Gen. Trunk's languished owing to lack of support.

ENGLISH MONEY MARKET.

Business on Change Fairly Cheerful, But There is Little Activity.

London, June 28.—The pressure was somewhat relieved by heavy borrowings from the Bank of England, money was much wanted today, owing to the month-end, half year-end and India Council requirements. Business on the stock exchange was fairly cheerful in most departments. There was little activity, but low level prices covered purchase and there was some buying. The warm weather stimulated the attendance. First class securities were steady. Argentine and Australian were in demand for the continent. The German difficulties were regarded as more pronounced. They closed firm and inactive. Erie was especially strong on dividend rumors. Great Trunk languished owing to lack of support.

TWO MEN SMOTHERED.

Laramie, Wyo., June 28.—A special from Grand Excelsior says the shaft house of the Crescent Copper Company's mine, in that camp, has been totally destroyed by fire. A. R. Coombs, formerly of Laramie, and Charles Booker of Loveland, Col., in endeavoring to extinguish the flames, were smothered. The efforts of the shaft mine workers were unavailing to rescue the two men or save the building. The loss is not stated.
