American citizens of Skaguay had insulted the British flag by tearing it down from the Canadian Customs House there, the Government have no official information. Neither the Secretary of State nor Mr. Macdougall, Customs Commissioner, have any word of the occurrence. The commissioner, however, states that there is no customs house at Skaguay, that port not being a customs port.
