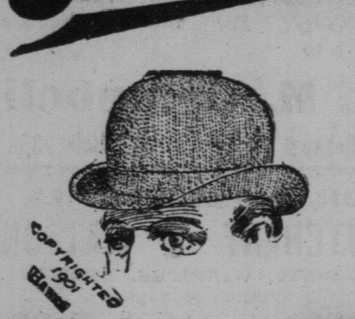

TALY'S KING IS RECKLESS

Likes to Give the Police the Slip and Mix With the People.

NOT WARNED BY HIS FATHER'S FATE

Experience With Penalties Whom He Gave New Coins Thought to Be False.

Rome, April 13.—The Italian newspapers state that King Victor Emmanuel had a curious adventure this week in an automobile tour in the Roman Province. At Conigli his car was stopped, and a summons for furious driving was served upon his chauffeur, Giuseppe Farulli.

At the famous falls, near Terni, the King, after admiring the scene, distributed a quantity of newly-minted silver pieces among the peasants, people who had never seen the new coinage, angrily gathered around the King, shouting that the money was counterfeit.

"Well," said the King, "if the coins are false, so is your King. Do you not recognize your King?" The Emperor, an ex-soldier, who had served in Rome, stepped to the front, and after a good look at the young sovereign, took off his ranger's cap and called for three cheers for Victor Emmanuel, which were given with much enthusiasm. Some papers, in telling the story, express displeasure at the King's imprudence in thus mixing with the people. As a matter of fact, the police charged with safeguarding his royal person are sometimes driven to the verge of despair by the King's recklessness. He is continually giving his special police the slip, for next to books and his wife and child, his greatest delight is to mix unrecognized in the crowd of his subjects.

DELHI CORONATION DURBAR.

Elephants Marching for Three Months to Attend.

London, April 12.—The Calcutta correspondent of The Daily Mail says: Elephants will begin marching from the capitals of native states in different parts of India next October, to take part in the great coronation durbar at Delhi in January.

Some of them will be three months continuously on the move before they get there, for an elephant ordinarily does only ten miles a day, and the last thing in the world that princely owners would like would be that they should arrive in bad condition for the ceremony. It is understood that the tame rhinos which marched in procession when the Viceroys visited Kathiawar are also to be sent to Delhi. The durbar is likely to be one of the last occasions on which the barbaric splendor of the coronation elephant will have given place to the motor-car. In all, eighty-six native princes and chiefs are to have camps at Delhi next January.

LORD CURZON AS A POET.

Verse on Memorial Tablet Erected for Soldiers. Calcutta, April 12.—The following verse, composed by Lord Curzon, appears on a brass memorial tablet the latter is erecting in the cathedral at Calcutta to the memory of members of the Indian volunteer contingent killed in action or died of sickness in South Africa:

"These sons of Britain in the East Fought not for praise or fame, They died for England and the best Made greater her great name." The inscription will be unveiled at a memorial service to be held on Sunday, March 23.

Annual Meeting of the National Amateur Lacrosse Union in Montreal.

FIELD CAPTAINS WILL REMAIN

Season Opens May 31 at Montreal. First Game in Toronto June 14, With Nationals.

Montreal, April 13.—The annual meeting of the National Amateur Lacrosse Union was held here Saturday and was devoted to its usual features. President Pittaway of Ottawa presided and the other delegates present were: T. O'Connell, Shamrocks; A. F. Rutter, Toronto; W. Fitzgibbon, Cornwall; M. Foran, Capitals; J. Lamarche, Nationals. The applications of Quebec and Point St. Charles teams for admission to the league were refused. A satisfactory report was presented by President Pittaway, to whom \$100 was voted for his services as president and secretary of the union.

It was decided to form an Intermediate League, under the control of the union, and a committee was appointed to draft bylaws to report not later than May 15. It was also decided that in the event of two teams being entered in any of the matches the championship shall be awarded to the team securing the largest number of goals in home and home matches on dates to be decided by the Committee of Management, the record to be divided. It was agreed that a team failing to appear promptly on the field at 3 o'clock should be fined \$10.

The proposal to abolish field captain was not pressed. Alfred Stewart, who had removed from Montreal, was again empowered to play with the Capitals.
