THOUGHT THERE WAS A FIRE

But It Was Only a Man Trying to Burn Soft Coal.

The vagaries of soft coal are already making their presence known. A crowd assembled in front of the typewriter office at 45 East Adelaide-street on Saturday afternoon, when the smoke which issued from the premises suggested a conflagration. Investigation showed that soft coal was being consumed in a combination furnace, which supplies heat to radiators and registers. The smoke escaped through the registers, and it was necessary to cover them with typewriter cloths and frons. This caused the smoke into the cellar, and Mr. Van Winckel says the man who looks after the heating was smoked up to the verge of asphyxiation.

NO THURSDAY CONFERENCE.

When shown the statement of Chairman Thomas of the Erie, that there would be no further conferences between the operators and Senators Platt, Quay and Penrose next Tuesday, they made special arrangements to have an intention of holding such a conference.

It was said on excellent authority that Governor Stone will not call an extra session of the legislature to take action on the strike.

WATCHING WASHINGTON.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Oct. 12.—Nothing is new developed in the strike situation here to-day. Not one soldier was sent out from the camp located in this city. There are rumors in circulation that an extraordinary effort will be made this week to start the colliers, but no information to that effect is forthcoming from the companies' officials. The strikers and citizens generally are not expecting anything to develop in the strike-affected territory, but are eagerly following events in New York and Washington.

That the feeling which has been quite general that some development in the direction of a settlement is near will be little or no increase in the production of coal during the next week. The miners are as firm to-day in their determination not to return to work until they get some concession, as they have been at any time heretofore. The appeal issued yesterday by the American Federation of Labor was received with satisfaction by the strikers, but a considerable discussion over the paragraph in the appeal which asserted that the miners were willing to leave their case in the hands of J. P. Morgan, was held. It is believed that attention was called to it last night, and the said it was an error. To-day he repeated that Morgan is not a workman, is some mistake, and that he does not care to call attention to it by discussing the matter.

STRIKERS ASKED TO RETURN.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Oct. 12.—The Erie Company to-night posted notices at its collieries at Pittston requesting the strikers to return to work to-morrow. The company assured all men who returned ample protection, and offered to return to work on the part of the coal companies to break the strike under protection of the troops.

SOME COAL MOVING.

Reading, Pa., Oct. 12.—Four trains of washery and mined coal, consisting of 250 cars, equal to 6750 tons, passed through the Erie yards to-day. The coal is intended for sale to the company's employees, and for use in the locomotive and water tanks. The Erie company has a large stock of coal on hand, and it is expected that it will ship some of it to-day.

OPERATORS WILL BE TESTED.

Saratoga, Pa., Oct. 12.—This is the beginning of a week which it is generally believed will put to a test the claim of the operators that they will be enabled to start up their collieries if given protection, and the counter claim of the United Mine Workers' organization as expressed in Wednesday's resolutions that the strikers will not return to work without concessions to be made by the operators.

That they have succeeded to some extent is evidenced by announcements made with some positiveness that various collieries will resume operations in the course of a few days. The Delaware and Hudson Company will make a start to-morrow morning at the most, the Green Ridge colliery will open up its Green Ridge colliery, probably to-morrow or the next day, but assuredly some day. Other companies say they are figuring on starting on a certain colliery, but decline to give the date. Claim is also made on the operators' side that forces at collieries already working are to be largely increased during the week.
