AS ATTEMPT TO AMERICA CZARIN'S POLICY

Witte Arrives at New York, and in Statement Trusts Peace May Be Forthcoming— Defends Russia's Conduct of War and Says Japan Is Not Yet Con- queror.

New York, Aug. 2.—Closely with plenipotentiary powers, personally prepared and signed by his sovereign, Sergei Witte, Russia's ranking plenipotentiary to the Washington conference, landed here today from the Kaiser Wilhelm cruise ship, the *Prinzess Alice*, which was the first of the Kaiser's fleet to arrive in New York. Mr. Witte, who is accompanied by his wife and two children, was met at the dock by Baron Rosen, Russian ambassador at Washington, with his first secretary of embassy, Mr. Hansen. Baron Rosen came on board as soon as the ship reached the dock and cordially greeted his guest and the members of his suite. After ten minutes' conversation, during which the majority of the passengers landed, Mr. Witte came ashore. He was met by a large crowd of well-wishers, including the Russian community in New York, and was escorted to the hotel where he is staying. Mr. Witte's arrival in New York is the first of a series of visits to the United States which he is making in connection with the Washington conference. He is expected to remain in New York for several days before proceeding to Washington.

For the friendly greetings of the American newspapers and the Russian press, Mr. Witte is expected to make a statement to the press.
