EAST END STORM WATER CAUSES

TROUBLE FOR EGERTON ST. CHURCH

Complaint Made to Board of
Works—City Engineer Makes
Sharp Retort.

The question of the right of the city
to turn storm water into a vacant lot,
without the consent of the owner of
such lot, gave the board of works some-
thing to talk about for half an hour
last night, and incidentally City En-
gineer Graydon was afforded an oppor-
tunity of evening matters with his
critics.

Some time ago a cement walk was
constructed on Egerton street for the
convenience of those who attend the
Egerton Street Baptist Church. The
walk was built on made ground, and it
was feared that the storm water which
flows down the road would wash the
ground away upon which the sidewalk
now stands. Consequently a box was
put in under the walk to carry the
water into the hollow land on the south
side of Egerton street and the Hamil-
ton road.

Church Board Objects.

The chairman and a couple of mem-
bers of the church board last night
waited on the council and demanded
to know upon whose authority the
drain had been put in. Ald. Saunders
explained that he and Assistant En-
gineer Kirkpatrick had consulted with
several members of the church board,
and had been told to go ahead, but the
chairman maintained that officially the
board knew nothing of what the city
had intended doing.

Is it not, to say the least, a breach
of etiquette," the chairman said, "to
turn water into our property without
asking the consent of the board?"

The question nettled the city en-
gineer, and he exploded a bomb among
the deputation of matters of politeness.

"Speaking of matters of politeness,"
he said, "I might say that I gave the
lot the church stands on to the board,
free and clear, and the board never as-
much as said 'Thank you.'"

The chairman of the church board
hastened to say that he was not aware
of this, and he apologized before his
time, and the matter was allowed to
drop. The box drain will be allowed to
remain in until such times as the board
sees fit to order the city to take it out.

Will Cut Rates.

A large deputation of residents of
Maitland street south, waited on the
board and asked that a reduction be
made in the excessive sewer rates be-
ing charged on the block between Hill
and South streets. The people are be-
ing charged 23 cents a foot, whereas
they were notified by the city before
the sewer was built that the cost would
be 10 cents a foot for ten years.

The board recommended that a re-
duction of 8 cents a foot be made, so
that the rate may be lowered to 15
cents a foot.

Bennett's Theatrical Enterprises
Company was given permission to erect
a handsome iron porch in front of the
theater on Dundas street.

The protest of Manager King of the
London Street Railway Company
against the use of an asphalt filler on
the York street hill pavement, was filed.

"The contract's let and we won't
meddle with the bandwagon," the
chairman said.

To Repair Street.

The Carling Brewing and Malting
Company asked that the west end of
Ann street, south of the brewery, be
properly graveled. In the spring and
fall, the street is a veritable mud hole.
The committee instructed the chairman
and engineer to visit the street, and if
the funds will warrant it, put the thor-
oughfare in proper shape at once.

A Hamilton asked permission to
erect a stairway on the south side of
the registry office on Talbot street lead-
ing to his shop. The board will visit
the place before taking action.

New Greenhouse Wanted.

Parks Commissioner Pearce reported
that the condition of the greenhouse in
Victoria Park is very bad. The board
will also visit this place, and see what
is wanted.

"I feel like dynamiting the old house,"
Ald. Garratt said. "It is a disgrace to
the city."

"There's no money to build a new
one," Engineer Graydon said.

"Well, recommend next year's council
to build a new one," Ald. Wyatt re-
marked in conclusion.

The claim for damages presented by
John Chapman was filed.

A large batch of local improvement
petitions for sidewalks and the like
were found to be sufficiently signed,
and they will be advertised at once.
