

87 MORE SOLDIERS INVALIDED HOME IN LATEST LOCAL PARTY

Men Reach London This Afternoon Via C. P. R.

ANOTHER "FIRST" MAN

Stratford Soldier, Sergt. Guilfoyle, Crossed With Original Contingent.

Invalided soldiers to the number of 87 arrived here via C. P. R. shortly after 1 o'clock today. In addition, about a dozen officers, most of whom had been overseas on conducting duty, returned to this district.

The men were taken to the Princess avenue barracks, and will be "boarded" and furnished with pay checks, so that they can go to their homes as soon as possible.

Among those who returned was Pte. J. Guilfoyle, a member of the "Original" contingent. He is returning to his home in Stratford.

Most of the men are men unfit for further service overseas, and may be employed on duty here in Canada or given their discharge.

Dinner was ready at the barracks, but it was not served, as the men had dined on the train.

W. O. R. as Guard of Honor.

A large detachment, consisting of over 100 men from the 1st Depot Battalion, W. O. R. Regiment, acted as a guard of honor at the station, and by keeping the crowd back, kept open an avenue through which the returned men could pass from the train to the waiting automobiles.

Among the men who arrived was Pte. F. Eddley, who enlisted with the first American Legion. He was wounded in the battle of Ypres on the 16th of June, 1917. He has served in France seven months. His home is in Detroit. He will come before the board this afternoon and hope to receive his discharge.

Pte. R. O. O'Neill enlisted here with the 15th Battalion. He has been in many of the large engagements in France.

A 3rd Member.

Pte. W. Hutchinson of 389 Central avenue enlisted here with the 33rd Battalion, and served two years and seven months in England.

Pte. J. F. Jeffery, 33rd Dover street, Chatham, enlisted with the 16th Battalion and was on police duty in England and Scotland.

Tripped While Carrying the Weapon—Condition Critical.

The accidental discharge of a .22 calibre rifle which he was carrying Sunday afternoon, resulted in a bullet entering the body of Charles Wood, a 14-year-old boy, whose home is at 791 Hamilton street.

LITTLE HOPE OF GETTING HYDRO FOR NEW USERS

Local Power Situation Growing Worse and Not Better.

FURTHER REDUCTIONS?

New 27,000-H. P. Demand Complicates London's Trouble in Getting Juice.

As a result of the request of the Amotol Company at Niagara Falls for 27,000 horsepower, the power situation in Ontario is more serious than ever, and may lead, it is claimed, to the London Electric Company being ordered by Power Controller Drayton to keep its plant in operation.

The hydro commission, in considering the request of the Amotol Company for power, if it insists on having it, there will be no alternative but to grant its request.

Already the question has been brought to the attention of the United States Fuel controller, and he has agreed to see that the Amotol Company gets coal to operate its power plant, even to the extent of supplying it with fuel.

If the request for 27,000 horsepower is granted it will mean that the municipalities will have to cut down their use of power to the same extent as at New Year's. This will mean that London will have to conserve 1,200 horsepower.

Sir Adam Beck stated to The Advertiser today that the request of the Amotol Company for 27,000 horsepower, and that the hydro commission turned over 2,000 horsepower to it on Saturday, the only one of its kind on the continent making this explosive, is classified as "very serious."

The hydro commission has but one customer taking more power than requested by the Amotol Company. This is the large carbide plant near St. Catharines.

As to the operating of the steam plant in Toronto and the possibility of the London Electric being forced to operate, Sir Adam said that these matters take care of themselves.

The Amotol plant is located in the large fertilizer plant which was recently shut down when the power commission cut off its supply of power.

No Reply Yet.

Many Local Complications.

The situation is complicated by many complications. The utilities commission is preparing to apply the same 60 odd power customers of the London Electric after Sunday night next. Coming on also are the Hunt's new mills and the Beattie Bros. next week. Both of these have contracted for considerable additional power. If the local supply is cut down it will not only mean the reduction of the street and store lighting, but also the probability that the majority of the London Electric customers, if not all, will be forced to go without power. Even then, General Macbeth, V. Buchanan, of the utilities commission expects difficulty in cutting down. Firms which resorted to their electric plants for the winter were not expected to be cut down. Both of these have contracted for considerable additional power. 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
