MOTHERS AND SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS ARE ASKED TO CO-OPERATE

Million Scholars To Be Allied in Dominion-Wide Drive for Victory Bonds.

A Sunday school war memorial is the plan through which the churches of Canada are appealing to the boys and girls and young men and women to share in the Victory Loan campaign. Sunday schools and young people's organizations are invited to buy Victory Bonds and donate these bonds to their respective churches. The threefold purpose is served of helping Canada win the war, of helping the churches to extend their mission work, and of commemorating the heroism and sacrifices of former members who have fallen at the front.

The churches joining in this plan are the Anglican, Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian. With varying objectives and with slight differences in detail, they have a common purpose and a common method. In the forefront of their appeal they are placing the nation's need, the missionary enterprise, and the hero-worship which is so deeply embedded in the heart of the boy and girl. During these three weeks they will inspire and organize a great crusade right across Canada. Among their watchwords are: "Every School At Least One Bond," "Every Every Scholar At Least One Dollar." The collecting of more than a million scholars in ten thousand schools, together with many thousands in the membership of the young people's organizations, will be no small factor in carrying the Victory Loan over the top. Enthusiasm are contagious, and a plan so nobly and earnestly conceived is sure to stir the imagination and energy of our youth.

The plan has received the hearty indorsement of the Dominion executive of the Victory Loan committee. It has been worked out on plain and simple lines. Each Sunday school or young people's organization is asked to determine without delay the amount at which it will aim. The minimum bond that can be purchased is \$50. Individual classes will give this or a \$100 bond and larger schools will set \$500 or \$1,000 bonds as their objective. Each school or society will organize to do its own canvassing, and to do it thoroughly. Emphasis is placed on the importance of every enrolled member doing his part, that it may be in reality a common effort of all Sunday school teachers in the Dominion. Early in the campaign the superintendent or treasurer of the school, or the responsible officer of the young people's organization will secure an application form from the local agent of the Victory Loan, and subscribe for bonds to

the amount decided upon. In the following weeks or months the installments will be paid as the sums promised by the young people are collected. When the payments are completed the bond will be handed over to the church. This undertaking is the response of the young life of Canada to the challenge of the hour. Our boys and girls will do much to fit themselves to meet that challenge by sharing unselfishly in this commemorative effort. Every encouragement is due them as they save and earn and give for this patriotic and Christian cause.
