BOYS OF RIFLE CLUB ATTEND A BANQUET

Unit Already Has Thirty-Four Medals For Marksmanship.

A highly enthusiastic crowd of boys attended the banquet of the London Rifle Corps, held in the Y. M. C. A. last night at 6:30.

The corps, which is a foster-unit of the Seventh Fusiliers, has at present 40 members. Recruiting will open at once for the unit in an attempt to bring the strength up to 80, which is the authorized strength and the number of uniforms supplied by the militia department.

Drills will be held in the armories every Monday at 4:30, and Friday at 7:30, under Sergt-Major Whitfield. Shooting will also be on the program of the unit, which already has 34 medals and a gold watch to the credit of its members for their marksmanship.

George Copeland, who is in command of the unit, expressed great regret at the retirement of Malcolm Bedford, who has acted as captain of the corps since it was organized. George Sessions, who has experience with various cadet corps of the city, will take the place of the retiring captain.

The unit expressed its appreciation of Capt. Bedford's services by presenting him with a high-class safety razor. Capt. Chester Butler, adjutant of the Seventh, spoke to the boys and stated that he would do everything in his power to make the corps a success. Uniforms and rifles will be drawn from the ordnance stores next week, and a room will be provided for the boys in the armories.







CANADA CONTINUES TO LEAD UNITED STATES IN TRAINING SERVICE MEN

Figures Published At Washington Show That Dominion Has More in Training For Like Period.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(By Canadian Press.)—In comparison with the United States, Canada continues to lead in the industrial retraining of disabled ex-service men.

According to official figures published in Washington by the federal board for vocational education, a total of 32,204 men had entered training of the disabled ex-service men in Canada during the period from April 1, 1919, to March 31, 1920. It is understood that an investigation is being made, and a round-up of the bootleggers is expected at any time.
