The request of the city council for the use of the public schools for the municipal elections in January was granted yesterday afternoon by No. 2 committee at its regular monthly session on the same terms as last year.

Complaints as to the working hours of the Ealing school construction were communicated to the committee by letter from the city council, which, after consideration, was ordered filed. The committee expressed regret that the communication contained no specific data or names to support the complaints, which, it was stated, were similar to some that had been received before.

Speaking on the matter, a trustee stated that he had, following the previous occasion, inquired of Mr. Puthurbough concerning it, and had been told by the contractor that he had called the workmen together, told them if they were correct, the men, he stated, had replied that they were quite satisfied, and that they wished other people would not interfere.

Another trustee pointed out that if the men desired to work overtime it was a matter entirely in their hands, and that they were paid for all the time they worked.

Tenders for the supply of hardware for the Ealing and Wortley Road schools were opened and the committee will recommend to the board that the tenders of the Hobbs Hardware Company, the lowest presented in each case, be accepted. The tender for the Ealing school is \$2,287.20 and for the Wortley Road school, \$1,657.20.

The offer of Hayman and Sons to install extra chimbling in the Wortley school required under the regulations of the department of education before the school can be approved, was ordered to be sent to the board with the recommendation that it be accepted. The work will mean an additional \$6,350.

The need of fire exit provision for the northwest room on the upper floor at Empress avenue school, a teachers' library at Alexandra school, regulation of the speed of some of the ventilating fans and the passing of the usual monthly accounts, were among other items of business dealt with.

Cleveland Professor To Give Clinic Before Western Ontario Doctors.

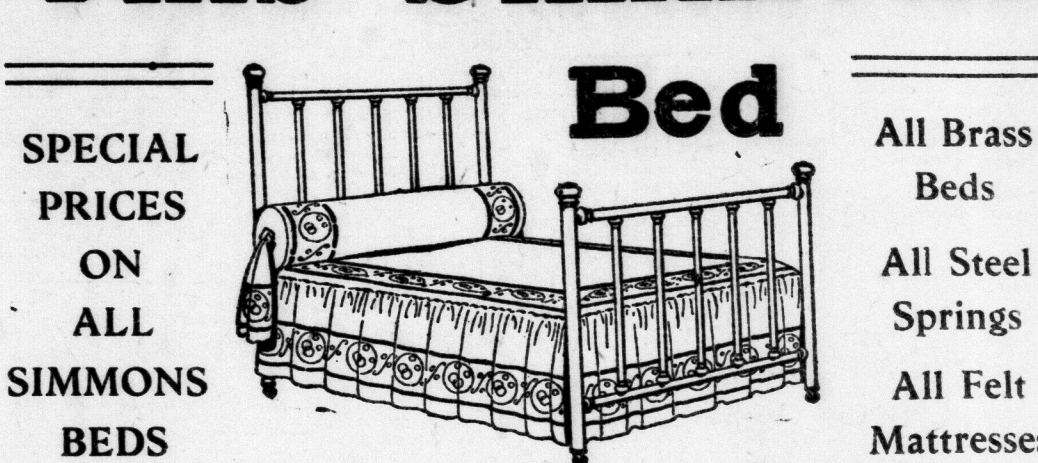
