## GOVT. NEGLECTS TO SEND ENVOY TO WASHINGTON

Refuses To Obey Parliament—Canada's Business Suffers Severely.

### OTHER MARKETS CLOSED

United States, Now Sole Selling Field, Is Not Being Developed.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—The practical cutting off of European trade, and the growing necessity in consequence of maintaining and extending the United States market for the Government of the need of considering representation in the latter country. Parliament last session approved, after considerable discussion, the proposal to appoint a Canadian minister plenipotentiary to Washington, but the proposal so far has not been implemented by the new Government. In the meantime, Canadian representation across the border is limited to a few clerks at Washington, the lone survivors of the trade commission which was sent to Washington during the latter days of the war. Of trade or other commercial representatives of Canada there are none outside of this.

motions looking toward the placing of a heavy duty or embargo upon Canadian wheat and flour. Up to December 3, the total of 55,000 bushels of Canadian wheat had gone by lake to the United States, and another 10,000,000 bushels are on the way. The United States navigation closes. In addition about 1,500,000 bushels have gone by rail. The release of the wheat to the United States is due to the fact that the banks are insisting upon its liquidation. It is also partly due to anxiety to clear as much as possible before the ice closes in. Fear of the probable action of Congress has also probably something to do with it. However, the fact remains that in spite of the movement, which netted Canada in the neighborhood of \$125,000,000, exchange yesterday rose to 15 per cent.

### Has Remained Out.

Great Britain has so far remained out of the Canadian market, and is said to be purchasing wheat from Canada at an advantage owing to exchange. Canadian trade with Australia has dropped off, and South Africa, to which Canada in the past has sent much wheat and flour, has put on an embargo. South American trade has fallen off through lack of credits. In fact, Canada is being thrown more and more upon the United States market, and more and more the necessity of having trade representation in that country being impressed upon the administration. The necessity will increase with the cessation of Canadian wheat shipments to the United States.

The United States at the present time has 100 officials in Canada reporting on trade and commercial conditions and opportunities. Canada in the United States has a few clerks. And yet it is vital to the interests of Canada at the present time, especially that Canadian interests should be looked after by men on the spot.

As far back as last January the Canadian Club of Boston memorialized the Government here, advising the creation of a consulate in the United States, which would look after all commercial, financial and general matters affecting Canada, or failing this, that commercial agencies be established at Boston and other cities of the United States. No attention apparently was paid to this advice, as Canada continues to be unrepresented across the border.

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—With the return to Ottawa of the finance minister, it is likely that the early conclusion will be given to representations urging removal of the so-called embargo on re-shipment of dollar currencies from London. The "embargo" was first imposed to keep Canadian money at home as much as possible, and to secure a better market for Victory bonds. The tendency now is to return to normal trading, and the effect of the recent removal of control from Victory bonds. Important questions would, however, be raised by the removal of the "embargo," and close study will be given before final action is taken.

Although the United States has an "embargo" there is no embargo in the strict sense of the term. The ban on re-shipment of dollar currencies mentioned is secured by means of an understanding between the minister of finance, banks and brokers.

### COUNCIL PUTS APPROVAL UPON AGRARIAN GROUP

Agriculture Body Plans Team-Work in All Political Fields.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 8.—Hon. T. A. Crerar today was formally recognized by the Canadian Council of Agriculture as national leader of the new political organization and as leader of the Farmers' parliamentary group.

The following resolution was adopted by the council at this morning's session: "That the council of agriculture recognize the third parliamentary group in the House of Commons as the present parliamentary exponent of the new national policy, and gives its full endorsement to their action in choosing as their leader the Hon. T. A. Crerar and commends him as national leader to all provincial organizations."

### Co-ordinating Committee.

It was decided also that there should be a co-ordinating committee, to consist of two representatives from each provincial political organization, with Mr. Crerar as the leader. This committee will consult with the national leader in an advisory capacity and will seek to co-ordinate the political efforts of the party throughout the Dominion.

Announcement of the council's political action was made at the close of the session by Norman Lambert, secretary of the council.

### Marketing of Grain.

This afternoon the council discussed the co-operative marketing of grain, did not come to any decision, adjourning until tomorrow. At each of the coming conventions of the Farmers' party it was assumed that the new national policy platform will be brought up for discussion, the planks of the party will be discussed, and legislative effect will be eliminated and new ones adopted to meet changed conditions.

The first provincial convention is that in Ontario next week.

### GODERICH SEEKING BETTER CONNECTION

Question Taken Up With C. P. R. Official At Trade Banquet.

GODERICH, Dec. 8.—A largely-attended banquet was held by the Goderich Board of Trade this evening in honor of H. P. Timmerman, industrial commissioner of the C. P. R. A large representation of members of the Huron County Council was present, in addition to businessmen and citizens.

Mr. Timmerman gave an address in which he sketched in a very interesting manner the development of the C. P. R., and the company's relationship to Goderich.

Among other addresses was one by Warden Pett, who spoke for the county council. William Campbell, Goderich's veteran municipal officer, sketched the commercial and industrial history of Goderich during the last 75 years. The speakers endeavored to impress the guest of the evening with the need of a steam connection for Goderich, which the C. P. R. could supply with great advantage to the section bordering upon Lake Huron.

### MINE-OWNERS WILL NOT RE-OPEN AWARD

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 8.—While willing to adjust individual cases of injustice or inequality within the present agreement, representatives of the mine owners today notified the mine owners that they were against any general reopening of the award that would tend to reopen the award of the United States anthracite coal commission.

### FOUND NOT GUILTY.

SIMCOE, Dec. 8.—Frederick L. Griffin, who was charged by Ivan Prounier of Port Rowan with the theft of automobile accessories and two bottles of whiskey from the garage of the complainant, and who elected to be tried by a higher court when arraigned at Port Rowan a fortnight ago, appeared before His Honor Judge Boles and was found not guilty. W. E. Kelly, K.C., was acting crown attorney and Messrs. Innes and MacKay defended Griffin.

## VETERANS, IDLE, HUNGRY, DEMAND WORK AND FOOD

March To Parliament Buildings and Toronto City Hall.

### MINISTERS SPEAK

Flynn Charges City With Breaking Pledges To Returned Soldiers.

TORONTO, Dec. 8.—Over 1,000 unemployed veterans, many of whom had not had any breakfast, they said, waited on the Ontario Government outside the parliament buildings at noon today, demanding work and immediate assistance to the veterans and their families from starving, then marched to the city hall, where they made similar demands upon the mayor and controllers from an improvised platform on the city hall steps. They were led by J. Harry Flynn, minister of the Grand Army of United Veterans. A number of women were in the crowd. In front of the parliament buildings the returned men were addressed by Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works for Ontario, and Hon. Walter Rolio, minister of labor, both of whom promised to do all they could to relieve the unemployment situation. The minister of public works stated that his department was opening up all work possible on the provincial roads instead of waiting until spring, and as many returned men as possible would be given work at fair wages.

### Dominion Question.

Hon. Mr. Biggs believed the unemployment situation primarily was one for the Dominion Government to deal with. "It was the Dominion Government that encouraged you to go overseas," he said, "and now they are the people who ought to help you. But for all that, we'll stand by you."

When the crowd started for the city hall the minister of labor was seen to slip a bank bill into the hand of a man who, the minister of labor had been told, had not eaten for two days.

At the city hall the veterans were informed by Mayor Tom L. Church that the board of control this morning had instructed the property commissioner of the city to open up an employment bureau at the city hall for returned soldiers. "Only Toronto men for returned soldiers," the mayor announced.

### Had Not Kept Promises.

The disappointed veterans at the mayor's announcement, J. Harry Flynn declared that the city had not kept its promise to the veterans in the matter of giving them the preference in employment.

At the parliament buildings and the city hall, Flynn demanded that something be done at once to relieve the suffering of the veterans who were in want. Their hunger must be appeased, he declared. He uttered a veiled threat saying that if the Governments, Dominion, provincial and civic, did not give the veterans a fair chance to earn money with which to buy food "we shall have to eat anyway."
