THE PREFERENTIAL CLAUSES

Furnished the Program Again Yesterday.

HON. MR. FOSTER RESUMED

And Gave the Government Another Shaking Up.

Mr. Laurier replied to the Ex-Minister of Finance and then Mr. Charles Hibbert Tupper took a turn. Mr. Foster resumed the Bank Note Contract as a Suspicious One-Tariff Matter Took Up the Time Till the Close.

Ottawa, May 28.—(Special).—At the commencement of to-day's proceedings in the House Mr. Laurier moved to take Mondays for Government business, whereupon Mr. Foster protested that the state of the order paper was such that at least next Monday should be left for the business of private members. The Premier compromised by leaving Monday, June 7, to private members, and with this the resolution passed.

Preferential Clauses Again.—The House then went into Committee of Ways and Means on the tariff resolutions, and the ex-Finance Minister resumed the discussion on the so-called preferential clause.

The Opposition, said Mr. Foster, felt that this clause was such a change, and a change for the worse, that they would be derelict in their duty not to present its objections to the Government and the country. In fact, it was the impertinence of this extraordinary clause into the progress of consideration of the tariff resolutions. Here was a Controller of Customs practically empowered to make commercial treaty-making power, for not a word of explanation had been vouchsafed as to the principle upon which it was proposed to proceed. It was not only that the House had a right to this information, but every citizen with whom it was traded had a right to know upon what basis we granted or refused this 25 per cent. reduction. There was no doubt that if it were a basis of a lower average tariff, the vast majority of nations could plead that their duties upon Canadian imports were lower on the average than ours. The Liberal manufacturers had been kept in line by the promise that they would not be injured by the tariff, but if the products of those countries were to be allowed to enter under the minimum tariff, our industries could not be maintained. The Government might fool with political partisans, fool with the civil service, but it could not fool with the business of the country. While the Opposition did not desire to insist on knowing upon what principle the Government proposed to proceed in this extraordinary tariff reduction, they were about to take by this resolution. There was no assurance of infallibility on the part of the Government. There were industries that would have been completely smothered out had the first tariff views of the Finance Minister prevailed.

Mr. Wood (Hamilton): No. Mr. Foster: Then why these changes? [Laughter.] He concluded with an appeal to the Government to make some statement as to their principle of proposed procedure under this amendment.

The Premier's Reply.—Mr. Laurier, by way of reply, repudiated any desire to avoid explanations, but protested that the Government had been called upon to answer the same enquiries over and over again. As to the charge that this resolution would open the door to serious complications, the Cabinet had taken all this into consideration, and, having looked through the tariffs of the whole world, they saw but one nation which could take advantage of the lower tariff offer, and that was
