FAST DRIVING
Arthur Vail, charged with driving a delivery team on Brussels street, on Monday last, faster than the law allows, was in the police court this morning.

Vail stated that he was driving only at a moderate rate of speed. Officer Perry testified that the defendant was driving faster than eight miles an hour and almost ran down two women, besides coming in contact with a guard placed about an excavation, knocking down the four feet lights, two of which were damaged.

His honor observed that it might be said that fifty per cent of the delivery teams were driven faster than the regulations allowed and desired to emphasize the fact that every delivery wagon driven faster than a walk around corners and on the wharves was liable to a fine.

Vail agreed to pay for the damages to the city property.

THE KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS HELD CELEBRATION TODAY

Eloquent Sermon Delivered to the Brethren in the Cathedral by Rev. Dr. McMillan at High Mass this Morning---Degree Work this Afternoon, Social Gathering Tonight.

Today the St. John Council No. 827 of the Knights of Columbus are celebrating their initial anniversary in a manner that bespeaks the great progress the society has made in a comparatively short space of time.
At 9:30 o'clock this morning the knights, numbering upwards of one hundred, assembled in their apartments at Berrymans' hall, headed by the City Cornet band, marched along Charlotte to Union, thence to Waterloo to the cathedral. The knights, each wearing a crucifixion, were in charge of George Lundy, sergeant-at-arms.

The sermon by Rev. Dr. McMillan was a very pleasing one, extending to the knights in the name of Bishop Casey a cordial welcome to the cathedral, and to some a cordial welcome to the cathedral city.
Who, he asked, would not be pleased to extend the welcome of such a prelate to so noble an order. It was fitting because the diocese was bound closely to the cathedral, the Island and St. John councils of the Knights of Columbus.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NEWS

Former Islander Killed on C. P. R. in Alberta---Tracadie Head Man Found Dead in Bed---Important Government Appointment.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., Nov. 15.—(Special)—It is understood that an important appointment has been made by the Dominion government in connection with the winter steamers. R. Vernon Longworth, late of the Bank of N. S., has been named to have charge of the marine wharf and the oversight of the men engaged in loading and discharging the winter steamers in port here and at Georgetown. This supposedly carries with it the receiving and distributing of freight, the care of perishable freight, the issuing of bills of lading, quoting rates to shippers and other miscellaneous duties.

A SLIGHT FIRE
The fire department was called out about 11 o'clock this morning for a slight fire in the rear of William Gray's store on Princess street. Last night the water pipes became frozen, and in endeavoring to thaw them out, the night watchman, the wood work about the pipes became ignited. The department was soon on the scene, and the fire extinguished without much difficulty.

COAL SCHOONER FILLED AND SANK
TORONTO, Nov. 15.—(Special)—"We have given up all hope. Our son is dead." This pathetic statement was made to a reporter last night by Captain Andrew Baird in the presence of his heart-broken wife, regarding his son, George Andrew Baird, Jr., of the schooner Mary, which was driven on Nov. 6th for Niagara and which has now been holed. It is the theory of Capt. Baird, Sr., that the sea filled the vessel's fore and aft, and that with 25 tons of coal on board her buoyancy was gone and she sank to the bottom like so much lead. The Mary's crew consisted of Capt. Baird, Edward Marsden, mate; A. Abrams and Benj. Dorey, sailors. All were married. Five years in present position. Sir class registered at New Brunswick. Capt. Baird owned the vessel, which was valued at \$1,500, and was insured.
