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MUNROE SENT TO THE PENITENTIARY FOR FIVE YEARS

Judge Forbes Inflicts Heavy Punishment on Man who Stole \$15 from James Daigle.

George Munroe, who was arrested on December 30th, charged with stealing \$15 from James Daigle in the I. C. R. yard, was this morning sentenced to five years in Dorchester penitentiary.

The police court Munroe pleaded guilty, but was sent up for trial by Judge Ritchie, and was tried this morning in the county court before Judge Forbes.

The complaint in the case is a Frenchman, who was on his way to Miramichi, where his family resides. He had been in the States, and was on his way home to see his sick child.

While in this city he met Munroe and two other fellows, and they were drinking in the I. C. R. yard. Daigle says that Munroe climbed into and stole his pocket book, containing \$15 to \$18. He discovered the robbery immediately, but Munroe ran. Charles Jones was around the car and he heard the yelling of the Frenchman.

Obtaining the facts of the case he pursued Munroe and captured him in a yard off Union street, just back of Miles E. Agar's warehouse. He placed him under arrest.

WHEAT EXPORT IS VERY HEAVY
