HELP THE CHILDREN

The children of St. John are handicapped by the fact that there are no large open spaces where they can play. This fact does not impress itself on the mind of the average citizen unless he has taken the trouble to stroll about the town for the purpose of seeking such open spaces. There are practically none, and even the school grounds are too small for play purposes.

It is true that St. John is not a large city, and that it is not far in any direction to shore or park or suburb. But the children do not go to these places. Many of them are too small, and cannot be trusted alone so far from home. As a result the street and alley and back-yard are their playground.

Older folk, preoccupied with the concerns of life, going about their business and their pleasure, are too apt to overlook the fact that there is a child-world in the city, filled with eager, active, sensitive young people who are growing up to manhood and womanhood, and whose home-training and school training are supplemented by the training of the street. Some parents care for their children even in their playtime. Some parents are able to clothe their children in the most appropriate and useful way, and provide them with the means of pleasure and amusement, and supervise their play as well as their work. But many do not.

Another couple of thousand dollars is to be spent on the new ferry steamer. As an absorbent of civic funds she has the old steamers distanced beyond all hope of being overtaken.

It may be hoped that clergymen, who realize perhaps more fully than others the moral value of supervised playgrounds, will commend to the sympathy of their people the movement to provide such grounds.

Because the city has no patrol wagon, a man too drunk to walk was carried to the police station this morning in an open vehicle. He do better in Halifax and other cities.

If the verdict in the case of Josephine Terranova is to be taken as an indication of popular feeling, the number of murders in the United States is likely to show a notable increase.

The citizens who can afford suburban homes in summer take their children to a great playground; but think of the great majority, who cannot afford this happiness for their little ones.

There is at last a prospect that the sanitary conditions in the country market will be improved.

Even the man who has no children remembers that he was once a child himself.

In 1888 he represented the Dominion relative to a proposed arbitration between the United Kingdom and Russia with reference to the seizure of Canadian vessels. Mr. Fitzpatrick was president of the Quebec branch of the Irish National League, and attended the convention in Dublin in 1906. He

was a member of the Quebec legislature from 1890 to 1896, and has since the latter date been a member of the house of commons. He was made solicitor-general in 1896, and minister of justice in 1902.

A Winnipeg despatch states that the railways are taxed to the utmost to accommodate the rush of new settlers. From the south the American stream has reached extraordinary proportions. The price of farm lands today in Western Canada is approaching that of Eastern Canada, people actually in some cases paying as much for unimproved farms as they could secure improved property for in the east, running as high as \$40 per acre in Alberta and Saskatchewan. In every district the homestead agents of the Government work day and night, lines being organized in some points where men keep their places for hours.

The King and Queen of Spain do not lack courage. They appeared in the streets of Madrid yesterday just as if they had not escaped a horrible death at the hands of the anarchists. Their people will honor them the more for their expression of confidence in the loyal regard of the average citizen. But the event of Thursday will make the rulers of other nations somewhat anxious. The throne, not the occupant, is the thing the anarchist aims to destroy.

OBJECT TO POSTERS

They Claim the Pictures of Stage Irishmen are Libel on the Race.

Posters advertising the show billed for the Opera House next week have brought forward a formal protest from the Hibernian Knights, who met in their rooms last night.

The advertisement describes the show as a comedy and it has for a title "The Irish Pawbroke." The posters are of the same make-up as those, which have aroused the indignation of the Irish race in the States and in some places in Upper Canada.

The Knights passed the following resolution last night: "Whereas certain posters have been posted in the city of St. John advertising a play called the Irish Pawbroke. And whereas, such posters are offensive and insulting to the Irishman and give misrepresentations of such character. Therefore resolved, that we denounce such posters and condemn the theatrical management that permits such representations and request all Irishmen as lovers of fair play to refrain from attending the theatres of which such posters are the advertisement."

It is said that Div. No. 1 of the A. O. H. will take action on the poster matter at its next meeting.
