

**PERMANENT PAVING WORK TO HASSAM CO.**

Tenders for permanent paving in Main, Smythe, Nelson, Water and Pond streets were opened by the board of works yesterday afternoon and the contract awarded to the Hassam Paving Co., the lowest tenderers. Main, Pond and Smythe streets will be done this year and the balance next year. J. S. Gibbon & Co., were awarded the contract for supplying coal at \$4.35 for Grand Lake blacksmith coal and \$6.35 for jumbo Scotch. A communication will be sent to the minister of public works asking him to have some dredging done on the Navy Island bar.

**Death toll of Railway Lines**  
Harrington, N.S., June 2.—One hundred and one persons were killed and 1,01 were injured on the steam roads and electric railways of Pennsylvania in the month of April, according to complete reports made to the State Railroad Commission. Of the number killed 38 were classed as trespassers, 20 were employees and six were passengers. The steam road killed 77 and the trolley lines 24.
