LOCAL NEWS

AT LITTLE RIVER.

TO JEWELLERS' CONVENTION.
Henry C. Page, of the firm of Ferguson & Page, left on Saturday to attend the annual convention of the Canadian National Jewellers' Association at Quebec. Mr. Page is the president of the New Brunswick Jewellers' Association. Upwards of two hundred delegates from all parts of Canada have arrived at Quebec for the convention. One of the important questions which will be dealt with during the convention is the drafting of a new constitution preparatory to applying to the Ottawa government for a dominion charter. Mrs. Page accompanied her husband.

A wedding of much interest was solemnized very quietly at the home of the bride's parents, 74 Queen street, this afternoon at 8 o'clock, when Irene, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. Fred McLean, was united in marriage to William Edmund Bacon Reed, only son of Mr. and Mrs. William Reed, of Quebec city. Rev. P. H. Bone officiated at the ceremony, which was a very pretty one. The house was beautifully decorated with flowers and ferns. The bride wore a travelling suit of navy blue broadcloth and seal tie with hat to match. Only the immediate relatives of the bride were present. After a dainty luncheon was served Mr. and Mrs. Reed left on the Montreal train to spend their honeymoon in Montreal and Quebec city. They will reside in Kenogami in the Lake St. John district where Mr. Reed is at present manager of the paper mill department of Price Bros. & Co., Ltd.

The bride was a popular member of the younger set of the city, and will be greatly missed by a host of friends, who will wish her every happiness in her new home.

WEST INDIES TRIP.
The itinerary of the trip to the West Indies by the delegation from the Canadian Manufacturers' Association is announced as follows: Halifax, Nassau, Kingston, Panama Canal, La Guaira (Caracas), Port of Spain, (Trinidad), Demerara, Trinidad, Grenada, St. Vincent, Barbados, St. Lucia, Dominica, Montserrat, Antigua, St. Kitts, Bermuda, St. John, N. B.

The larger part of the party will leave Halifax tomorrow on the C. G. M. M. steamer Canadian Fisher. Some who could not obtain accommodation on this steamer will go via New York by the White Star liner Megantic on February 18. They will join the first party at Kingston, Jamaica.

W. S. Fisher of this city, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, will travel with the New York party. Among the party sailing from Halifax tomorrow will be Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Davidson and G. Clifford McAvity, representing T. McAvity & Sons of this city. The mission of the delegation is to study conditions in the West Indies and establish trade relations more firmly with the business men of that country, and to introduce Canadian goods on the West India market. The whole party will return by the R. M. S. P. line, arriving at St. John on April 11.

POLICE COURT.
The preliminary hearing of the case against John Perry and Matthew Friars, charged with the theft of an automobile from J. A. Pugsley, was continued this morning. J. A. Barry and E. J. Henneberry appeared for the defence. Policeman Garnett, recalled, testified that since he gave evidence last he had gone to the garage of Mr. Pugsley and seen a car there similar to the one he saw coming out of the alley near the George warehouse. Policeman Gibb told of seeing a car coming along Main street about 2.30 o'clock in the morning of Jan. 9 traveling at a great rate of speed in the direction of Indian town. Later he went to Mr. Pugsley's garage and saw there a car similar to the one he had noticed. The headlights, he said, were larger than those he had seen on any other car. The case was postponed until Friday morning.

A Lady Bootlegger.

Three men pleaded guilty to charges of being drunk and were remanded to jail. One of them said he gave a girl \$6 for the liquor he had drunk. His Honor remarked that he had thought it would not be long before the girls took to bootlegging because they showed more adaptability to that business than did the men.

NEW YORK'S INFLUENZA.
New York, Feb. 13.—A falling off in influenza and pneumonia cases was reported by the board of health today. Influenza cases numbered 356, as compared with 598 cases.

Cases of pneumonia totalled 102, a decrease of eighty-two over Sunday.

Harry Gardiner Nicholas, manager of the Post Intelligencer, Seattle, was stricken suddenly in his office last night and died.

DR. WHITE TELLS OF DEATH THREAT

Case Against Phinney and Miller Opened Today.

Doctor Testifies of Receipt of Letter and Sending of Decoy Package—Knew No Reason for Demand—Commends Work of Detectives.

A story resembling those told by victims of the "Black Hand" organization was recited this morning in the police court by Dr. W. W. White during his evidence in the case against Clifford Phinney and Seldon Miller, charged with sending a letter to Dr. W. W. White threatening his life if the sum of \$1,000 was not sent according to directions given in the letter.

Dr. White told of receiving a letter in the morning mail on Tuesday, Feb. 7, telling him to send \$1,000 to Beyer's fruit store in Coburg street before Thursday at 4 o'clock or he would be shot and killed. It also warned him not to notify the police, but he put the letter in the hands of Sergeant Detective Power and did not send the money. On Friday morning, he said, he received a second letter saying that it was known he had been in communication with the police and warning him a man had been hired to shoot him if the money was not forthcoming according to directions before 4 o'clock on Monday. He consulted with the detectives regarding this letter and as a result of the conversation made up a package in an envelope, sealed it with red wax, and sent it to the store addressed as had been directed. On cross-examination, he stated that he had never seen the defendants to know them and didn't know of any reason why they should demand the money from him. The case was postponed indefinitely for further evidence.

E. S. Ritchie appeared for Miller. It is said that the false package was left at the store by a messenger while the detectives took up their station across the street. Yesterday afternoon they noticed two young fellows walking back and forth along Coburg street and saw one of them go into the store while the other stood on the sidewalk. When the first young fellow came out they walked along Charlotte street and into a building near King square, where they were caught by the detectives. Miller is alleged to have had the dummy package in his possession when they were arrested. The penalty for the crime, with which these young men are charged is fourteen years in the penitentiary.

Dr. White today spoke in highly complimentary terms of the work of the detective department.

THE STEAMERS

The first of the Canadian Pacific Trans-Atlantic fleet to leave Canada this Spring, with the opening of the St. Lawrence route, according to the schedule of sailings just announced, will be the "Empress of Scotland," which inaugurates a new service between Quebec and Hamburg via Cherbourg and Southampton. She will sail from Quebec on May 3rd. The "Empress of France" will also be in the Quebec-Hamburg service, sailing from Quebec on May 10th. The "Empress of Scotland" and the "Empress of France" will form the Trans-Atlantic link of the through service between Quebec and the Orient, via Canada. Quebec will also be the Canadian port of call for the "Empress of Britain," which will be in service to Liverpool. Her first eastbound sailing is on May 20th. Upon the return from her second voyage, the "Empress of Britain" will sail from New York to Liverpool, on March 23rd.

The Montreal season will be inaugurated with the sailing of the S. S. "Scandinavian" on May 4th, bound for Southampton and Antwerp.

The "Scyllian" will continue on the Cuba-West Indies service with regular sailings from St. John via Boston, to Havana and Kingston.

Until the opening of the St. Lawrence season, St. John is the Canadian port of call for the Canadian Pacific fleet, with the "Melita," "Montcalm," and "Minnedosa" on the Liverpool run and the "Prentiss," "Athens," and "Corcoran" in the Glasgow service. The "Metemora" will sail for Liverpool and Glasgow, on March 24th. The "Scandinavian" is in service to Antwerp, via Havre and Southampton, and the "Corcoran" will make this trip on March 11th. The "Melita" will leave St. John on April 15th for Southampton and Antwerp.

In addition, the "Ratford," "Bothwell," "Dunbridge," "Mottisfont," and "Montezuma" will take care of the freight service from St. John to London and Hamburg, to Liverpool and Avonmouth to London, and to Boston, Havana, and Kingston, until the opening of the St. Lawrence season when Montreal becomes their regular summer port.

The success of the regular passenger service inaugurated by the S. S. "Scyllian" last December between St. John, Boston, Havana, Cuba and Kingston, Jamaica, has been such that the Canadian Pacific is now placing its large cargo ship, the "Montezuma," in service between these ports. The "Montezuma," built by Duncan & Company, Port Glasgow on the Clyde, in 1918, is one of the most modern steel cargo ships, of over 5,000 tons, 405.3 ft. in length, 33 ft. in width and 27.4 ft. in depth. She will sail from St. John on Feb. 28th for Boston, Havana, and Kingston, with a large Canadian cargo, principally potatoes, fish, flour and newspaper.

The "Scyllian" is due to leave Havana on the 12th, she will proceed to Kingston and return via Havana and Boston, and is due at St. John on March 16th. She is scheduled to sail from St. John on her next south-bound voyage on March 28th.
