

## WARNS AGAINST OVER-CONFIDENCE RE PROHIBITION

A Word Relative to Forthcoming Referendum—Race Track Betting.

Toronto, Sept. 25.—A warning to ministers and people against the danger of over-estimating the strength of the prohibition sentiment, and under-estimating the influence and power of the forces supporting the liquor traffic in connection with the referendum that is to be taken, was given here yesterday in the form of a resolution passed by the executive of the board of home missions and social service of the Presbyterian church.

The same body went on record as strongly disapproving of the dominion government in any way being identified with the business of race track betting by attempting to regulate the evil.

**PROBE LOSSES OF TEXT BOOK MAKERS**  
Toronto, Ont., Sept. 25.—The Ontario government it is expected will appoint a commission to go into the matter of losses suffered by the publishers of text books in "carrying on" from year to year during the war under expired contracts, thereby implementing a promise made by the former minister of education, Hon. Mr. Cuddy.

In the early part of the war the government's contracts for the publication of some text books expired. At that time costs were jumping, and the government rather than make new contracts on the basis of higher costs, asked the publishers to carry on under the old contracts, giving assurance that they would be fairly dealt with.

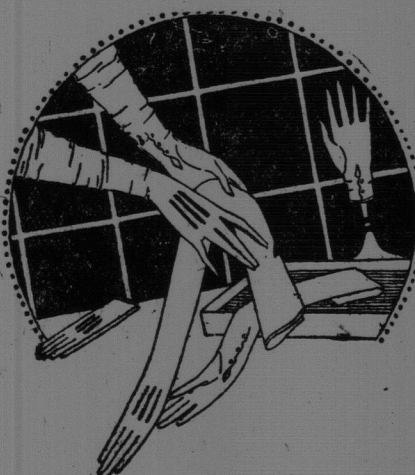
