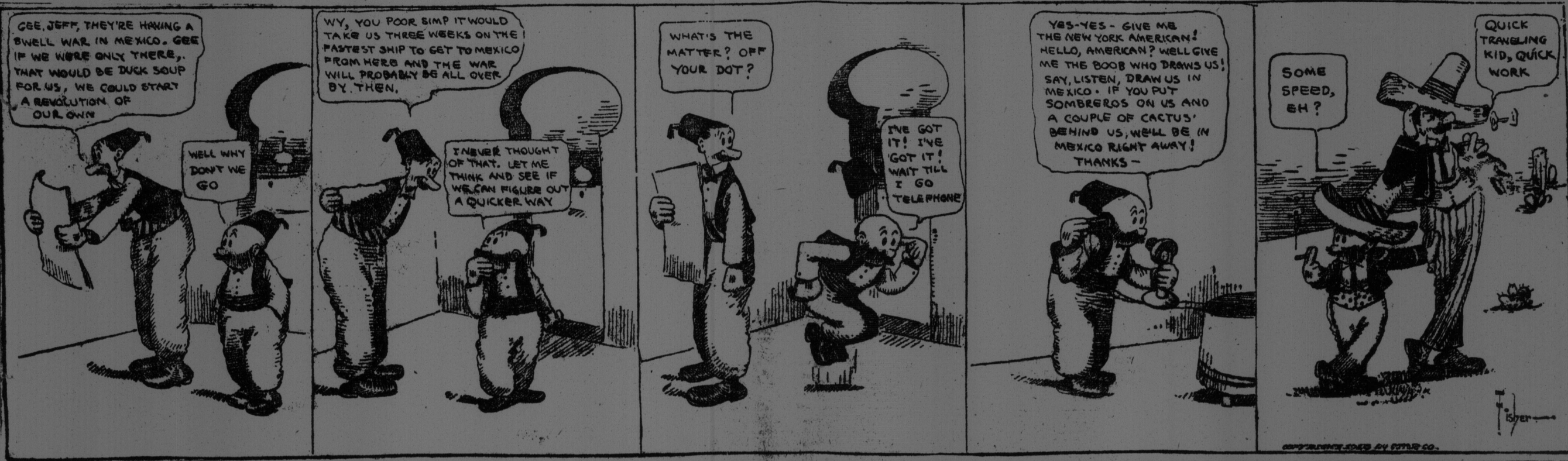

### SPORT NEWS OF A DAY, HOME AND ABROAD

#### THE RIFLE

**Frederick Tournament.**  
There will be a trap shooting tournament open to residents of York and Sunbury counties on Good Friday at 2.15 p. m., either on the flats or the river near Anderson street, Frederick. The match will be at fifty birds.

#### ATHLETIC

**Joe Driscoll.** A Buffalo boy, defeated Kiviat, Olympic champion, in a three-quarter mile run in Buffalo on Saturday night and broke a world's record. His time was 3:07 or 1:35 seconds better than the previous record, held by Kiviat. Driscoll won the race by three yards.

#### THE TURF

**Amherst Races.**  
The Amherst Speedway Association held their annual meet on Saturday. In the second heat of the free-for-all race, Otto Skes, owned by Alder Ederkin, made a record time of 1:11.4 for a half-mile track. Otto Oakes, Ederkin, won the free-for-all race; Tommy Coffey, Dobson, won the 2:30 pace and Park Chatto won the three minute trip.

#### HOCKEY

**Saturday Results.**  
The Royal Military College team won the intercollegiate hockey championship on Saturday by defeating the McMaster College team, 3 to 1, in Toronto. In New York on Saturday the Quebecs defeated the Wanderers, 6 to 3, in Montreal. In Vancouver, however, the series, 2 goals to 11.  
The Winnipeg All-Stars were defeated again on Saturday in the Boston arena by the Boston Athletic Association team. The score was 5 to 0.  
The Winnipegpega defeated the Edmonton team in Winnipeg on Saturday night, 9 to 8.

#### THE RING

**Saturday's Bout.**  
Los Angeles, Cal., March 15.—In one of the fiercest light weight fights ever seen in the Vernon arena, Bud Anderson, of Vancouver, and "Knockout" Brown, of New York, battled to a draw this afternoon. Both boys took great punishment.  
In the eighth and twelfth rounds Anderson had Brown almost out, but in the twentieth the New Yorker had his opponent in the same condition, the bell rang and Anderson from a possible knockout.  
Brisbane, Australia, March 15.—Sam Langford, the Boston heavyweight pugilist, today defeated Jim Barry, of Chicago, in his first round. This is the second time Barry has been beaten by Langford, their last fight occurring at Melbourne, in May, 1912, when the men went eleven rounds.

#### BASEBALL

**The St. Louis Browns.**  
George Stovall of the St. Louis Browns picked out a satisfactory outfield between the 10th and 12th bases, when the big league was held in its correct position. Last season the St. Louis team was a fairly well off in the field, and as the ones in the south go on, it looks as if the Browns, Williams and Compton would outshine any of the recruits which Stovall has gathered under his standard at Waco, Texas.

Larry's younger brother will also receive a like amount when he becomes of age. Connolly does not think he will go into professional baseball again.

**No Poker, says Chance.**  
While cigarette smoking has been prohibited by Manager Evers of the Cubs and Manager Tucker of the Reds and the Pirates have been accused of signing contracts including anti-poker clauses, Manager Frank Chance of the New Yorks has made an important move and has directed that no poker be played on the team. He has put into effect a rule that any member of the team caught in the act of playing poker in hotels away from home or in the clubhouse, will be dealt with severely.

**Chance believes that poker games in railroad cars and in hotels away from home are the main cause of the trouble.** He has made a study of this evil among ball players and the line has come to the conclusion that several dissections in many instances can be traced to losses at cards. Some players can play poker better than others. He does not intend to insist upon total abstinence, however, because he believes that beer drinking in moderation and violent exercise on the ball field each day is a benefit. But drinking to excess will be dealt with severely.

**C. W. Murphy of the Cubs tried to enforce a temperance rule at Tampa recently,** but Evers objected. Evers declared that it would be a serious handicap to deprive his men of a few glasses of beer, but he agreed with Murphy that players who indulged in stronger stuff should be disciplined for the first offence. Evers and Tucker have similar ideas. Both agree that the "coffee naps" make the players nervous and affect their breathing. The Pirates, on the other hand, will find themselves in hot water if they drink anything stronger than water, soda, tea or coffee. Dreyfus has signed his men to iron-clad contracts and is prepared to inflict heavy fines if the anti-liquor rule is violated.

**Diamond Sparkles.**  
White Sox players who have spent time on the sick list thus far are Ed Walsh, Alfalfa, Cliff, Dazy Jones, blistered heels; Rollie Zeider, bole; Shano Collins, persistent charley horse and Red Russell, touch of malaria.

**Runt Walsh is being touted by Dooin as the best all round utility man and pinch hitter in the National League.** Chris Von Der Ahe has picked all the time baseball team. He names Hal Chase as the best first baseman ever born. The New York State League this year is introducing to the fans Cookkolakmet, Bradavelski, Kosolostevski, Greenlagmet, the daisiest and the Svetonick brothers to figure in the box scores.

**Evers of the Cubs has yet to ship several castoffs to Kitty Bransfield's Montreal team to pay for Al Matters,** the former Boston National southpaw, now on the Chicago roster.  
Jimmy Callahan thinks that the rules be changed to allow a catcher to grab a runner and stop him when overambition points the way home. Last summer Callahan did this and the umpire pointed the way to Jimmy's home for the rest of the day.

**Ty Cobb says that ten years from now salaries of \$15,000 to ball players will be common.**  
Pitcher Jim Scott, now trained down to 181 pounds, pronounces himself cured of rheumatism and says he will be one of the best winners on the White Sox staff, leaving Ed Walsh out of it.  
Harry Sylvester, a White Sox outfield recruit, is said to be greater in his line than Konetehy and Luderus, who also hailed from the Wisconsin-Illinois League.

**Sam Thomason, star slugger of the Detroit world's champions in 1907,** has just passed his fifty-third birthday.  
Fred Clarke says that one of the Pirates' best pitchers this year will be Jack Perry.  
Frank Baker's inaugural appearance in a game was celebrated with five hits out of six times up. They were three singles, a double and a triple.

**Clarke is impressing on the Pirates' young pitchers the necessity of throwing both curves and straight balls with the same motion.** "If there is the slightest difference," he tells them, "these big leagueers will be quick to detect it and then you might as well announce beforehand just what you intend to serve the batter."  
Steve O'Neill has deserted the holdouts and decided to sign and catch again for the Cleveland.  
Archie Latham, once the star third baseman of the St. Louis Browns and until recently with the Giants has quit the national game and is moving deceptions in a three party in Brooklyn.

### MAKE BEAUTY SPOTS OUT OF THE BLEMISHES

"Victoria, the Garden City" is a slogan that was suggested to signify a progressive movement some time ago, and it was only placed in the discard in favor of the more striking one. "Victoria" is the Chinese, but so the climate is something that promises to take care of itself, many of the people who squandered in the province as an attractive motto are now turning their attention to matters more material, and one of these is the beautification of the city by a greater distribution and exhibition of the flora of the country, as a kind of gratification but none the less pleasing and necessary expression of the climate.  
And, not unnaturally, the organization in the city which is now devoting its attention to this question, is the citizens' committee, and its primary object is the beautification of the city for carnival week in August of this year. The preliminary movement in connection with this new subject is that something in the nature of a garden club should be organized, not merely among residents who own private homes in the suburban districts, but property owners in the city proper who own vacant lots, the idea being that every available spot suitable for the cultivation of flowers or even vegetables should be utilized, not for the sake of the product, but simply for the effect, and it is claimed that in any case, flowers or cabbage on a vacant lot will not act as a detriment to its sale.  
The home garden aspect of the prospective club's activity is easy enough; it is the vacant lots that present the problem; for even if the right is granted to make use of them for the purpose in mind, who is there to perform the transformation? The Citizens' Committee sees no difficulty at all, believing that the opportunity will reveal the man or the man. They go further than that, bland speculation, however. They point to other cities where a similar work has been undertaken with complete success. It appears that in the city of Minneapolis what was termed a vacant lot garden campaign was started by making an offer to the people, through the newspapers and otherwise, to obtain for them the use of any vacant lot they might choose to plow, harrow and
