leaving any British Port. (2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable to

fine not exceeding one hundred pounds. At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel noists no colours and runs away, it is liable to be fired upon.

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
