

A FEW THOUGHTS ON CO-EDUCATION

Dr. Lyman B. Sperry Refers to Causes Which Have Operated Against Movement

Speaking on the subject of co-education, to which he has given special attention, Dr. Lyman B. Sperry, who is lecturing in this city at the present time, said he believed that the progress of co-education in the United States was not justified by results, but that while he had not lost faith in co-education as a factor in the training of the young during the period of adolescence, it was to be successful there would have to be sweeping changes made in the system as actually carried out, and more supervision of the girls.

The ugly stories which had leaked out in the last few years had had immeasurably injured the cause of educating boys and girls together at a susceptible age, and it was common knowledge that the American girl enjoyed such a large measure of liberty that any attempt to resist that liberty had aroused the greatest opposition.

He recognized that fact in discussing the subject, and the absence of discipline, the love of social pleasures, and the attractions of the theatre had served to create in the girlhood of America, and in a lesser degree in Canada, that freedom from justifiable restriction which was fraught with peril to the little realized by the easy-going parents.

The enormous step which had been made in the enfranchisement of women, and he was old enough to be born in the year in which liberal America first granted a bachelor's degree to a woman, had brought with it certain disadvantages, particularly in the high schools, where the children were educated together, and lost much of the mutual respect of the sexes, without offering that higher inspiration which the hope of the friends of co-education had seen as a result of that intercourse. The danger was that the modern girl loved freedom and amusement too much, and anxious for attention without responsibility she might easily become a flirt.

He pointed out that it could hardly be expected that youths and girls could come bright and fresh to their studies after wasting their afternoons in idle amusement or spending the evenings at theatres or musical halls, and yet it was but an example of the tendency of the present day towards the craving for excitement, for something out of the ordinary, and that which satisfies not people in this western continent had learnt to crowd too much into the day and live too fast, and this peril had gripped many of the schools where scholars at a susceptible age were being taught, and its dangers were as great as the culpable ignorance in which parents often left their children at vital matters.

In co-education in its truest sense the girl should imbue the boy with some of the traditional gentleness of the east, and the boy by example show the girl some of the proverbial school-boy code of honor which was often lacking in girls' schools. He believed that a recognition of the strength of each of the sexes would go far towards living down the undoubted prejudice against joint instruction of the sexes.

BOY FOUND DEAD.

Believed to Have Been Run Down By Auto and Left Without Medical Assistance.

New York, Nov. 15.—Boxing enthusiasts hurrying through the first snowstorm of the season, on their way home from the Leach Cross and Tommy Maloney bout, here late last night, saw a small boy seated on a pile of building material beside the curb. Someone shouted to him the warning that he would freeze to death there, and when he did not answer a man climbed on the pile and found the dead child. His back was broken, his body crushed and his skull fractured. The police believe he was run down by an automobile and that the guilty driver propped the mangled form up against the lumber, and drove off without so much as calling aid.

BOZIK IS SENT TO HIGHER COURT

Committed on Charge of Having Stolen Money in His Possession

New Westminster, Nov. 15.—John Bozik was committed for trial in the police court yesterday on the charge of having \$5,000 of stolen money in his possession. Through-out the proceedings Bozik hardly said a word, but maintained a silence that seemed to puzzle all present.

Before the trial commenced Mr. Goodstone, counsel for the accused, complained that the police had withheld much necessary information when asked for it, but Magistrate Edmonds answered that although he had been following the case carefully he had found no cause for protest.

When the charge was read to the prisoner he did not seem to understand a word, and his counsel stated that he was too ignorant to know whether he was being tried by the magistrate or by his lawyer.

Mr. Phipps, accountant at the local branch of the bank, testified to finding the office in disorder on his arrival the morning following the robbery. There was \$271,000 missing out of the \$385,000 that had been left in the bank the previous evening. He had found \$30,000 lying on the bed in the clerk's room, and the rest in various places.

The money returned to the bank was then produced for identification, and Mr. Phipps counted five and ten dollar bills to the amount of \$4,130.

TUG IS BURNED TO WATER'S EDGE

The Chemainus, Gutted by Fire, Sinks at Bunkers at Vancouver

Vancouver, Nov. 15.—On Monday night fire broke out on the tug Chemainus, moored at McDonald-Marpole's coal bunkers, and as a result the vessel was gutted in the water's edge and sank. Only her funnel and mast now show above the waters of Coal Harbor.

The Chemainus was built two years ago at Chemainus and is owned by the Victoria Lumber & Manufacturing Co. She is a vessel 110 feet long and was valued at \$5,000. It is stated that she was not insured.

The outbreak is a mystery and the first alarm was given by the skipper, who was awakened by smoke. He called the crew, but it was soon seen that the boat was well alight.

An alarm was rung in and the fire department attended, but the engines had trouble in getting to the scene of the blaze. The situation assumed a serious phase when the burning vessel threatened to set fire to the coal bunkers, so her moorings were cast off and she was towed clear. She sank about 25 yards from the wharf.

The Chemainus arrived on Monday with two scoops of coal for McDonald, Marpole & Co.

JUDGMENT GIVEN IN CASE OF LYNDBURST

Officers of British Ship, Which Blew Up, Are Exonerated—Story of Accident

The official inquiry into the loss by fire of the British sailing ship Lyndhurst, 2,849 net tons, has been concluded at Capetown and judgment delivered. The Lyndhurst suddenly caught fire off the South African coast in August and was abandoned by her officers and crew. Earlier in the year the Lyndhurst sustained damage, supposed to have been caused through her striking an unknown object of Cape Recife.

The court, in delivering judgment, expressed surprise that no attempt appeared to have been made in Durban to rectify the damage mentioned by the Durban surveyor. These defects were more or less likely to let gas force itself from the hold to portions of the deck.

The court considered the methods adopted at Port Elizabeth regarding saturated ballast were not sufficient for safety, and that the explosion might have been avoided if the ballast had been saturated with paraffin and naphtha had been jettisoned. They did not entertain the theory of spontaneous combustion. The precise cause of ignition could not be stated as he there. There must have been a direct application of flame to the gas which escaped from the hold.

Although the court considered that the captain made errors of judgment in certain respects, these were not so serious as to warrant them dealing with his certificate, and all other officers were entirely exonerated. The court also found that the conduct of the crew was not at all blameworthy, and that no discipline must have been well maintained. As all the ship's papers were lost, the court recommended the issuing of duplicate certificates.

The Lyndhurst, which belonged to the Anglo-American Oil Company, was chiefly engaged in the oil-carrying trade, and on her last voyage had loaded a cargo of naphtha in cases at Amu Bay, in Sumatra, 70,000 cases being shipped. The ship's destination was South Africa, part of the cargo having to be discharged at different ports, among which were Delagoa Bay, Algoa Bay and Cape Town. Cargo was being discharged at the first two ports, and the ship was on her way to Cape Town to complete the discharge of cargo, having left Algoa Bay August 15, when, on the morning of August 21, the ship, then being in latitude 35° 30' south, longitude 21° 50' east, and about 55 miles off Mossel Bay, a terrific explosion took place in the forward part of the ship. Hatches and fore-cabin were blown into the air, some going through the topsails.

Capt. Parnell, who was asleep in the chartroom, was aroused by the report and rushed on deck, not knowing what was happening. He was in the situation at a glance he at once ordered the helm up and put the ship before the wind, with the object of keeping the fire, which had broken out to a great height from the hold, to the fore end of the ship until such time as the boats could be got out and the crew out of the ship. Strange as it may seem, not one of the crew was seriously injured, and the captain was pleased to see all hands gather on the after part of the ship, although it was little less than a miracle that they succeeded in doing so. The ship's papers were eventually picked up by the Clan Line steamer Clan Maclean and the men landed at Mossel Bay.

SMOKING IN OFFICES.

Probable Extension of Principle Adopted in Public Buildings to Private Firms.

The gradual approximation of this city to other places in the Dominion in the restriction of smoking to suitable occasions has been strengthened by the recent action of the legislature and municipal authorities to cut out smoking during office hours. The city hall was the first to adopt the move under Mayor Morley's edict, and the provincial parliament buildings followed suit, although there have been constant mutterings about the condition of affairs at the House since the order came into force.

In the council chamber itself the aldermen have not taken kindly to the rule, and two or three insist on smoking during the deliberations. At the last meeting Mayor Morley called Aldermen H. M. Fullerton and Hummer to order for smoking, and asked how could they expect the officials to obey the order of the executive if the city fathers themselves set the example? Alderman H. M. Fullerton laid aside the fragrant weed with evident reluctance, but Alderman Hummer was not to be checked with his smoke. Probably the members of the city council permit their members to smoke, unless in committee.

Newcomers to this city frequently express their surprise at the amount of smoking permitted in the offices and stores. It is no uncommon thing in Victoria for the customer or business man to find the clerks or salesmen smoking as they attend to business, and it is not to be wondered at when the practice is so prevalent among a large class of mercantile men to do their business with cigar or pipe in their mouths, that they should be quite indifferent to the question of entering another man's office. It is distinctly a habit restricted to this continent, but is commoner here than in many cities of the Pacific coast.

There is no doubt the day is coming here when there will practically cease to be any smoking permitted in offices or stores during business hours, just as it has been prohibited in the public offices here.

SNOW FORGES TEES TO LIE AT ANCHOR

Spends One Night at Banfield—Heavy Snowfall on Coast—Has Long Stay Here

When the steamer Tees, Capt. Gilliam, which arrived in port on Wednesday from Clavonout, was docking at Alberni on her northbound trip, the heavy snowfall on the coast was a great hindrance. On Saturday, the Tees called at Alberni, but the great part of the white matter had disappeared owing to heavy rains.

The Tees sailed from here on Friday night and the following day encountered a heavy snowstorm. On Saturday night the weather became so thick that the Tees remained at anchor at Banfield until morning before proceeding. The decks of the steamer were piled high with snow, and the crew engaged in a night with those on the dock and a lively scene ensued. The men aboard the Tees were accredited the victors, driving their opponents into the city.

Outside of the snowstorm, the weather was good, a heavy swell being encountered when rounding Cape Beale. The steamer brought to Victoria about seventy passengers and as freight had sixty barrels of whale oil from Sechart.

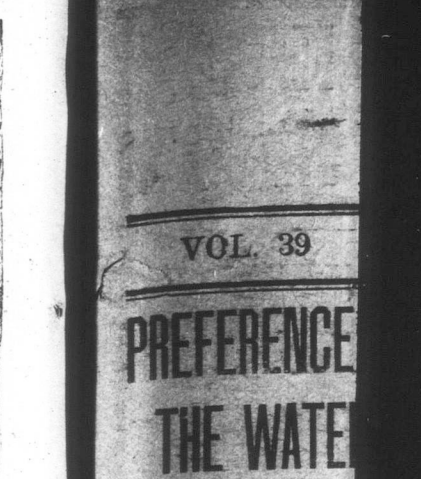
CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY.

Splendid Work Is Being Accomplished in City. The Children's Aid Society are making their work felt in this city. The results of the last few months show conclusively how closely their efforts touch the home interests and how through the co-operation of the parents their work is made effective in the better care of the children. Through the constant watchfulness and prompt action on the part of the society, over sixty cases have been investigated during the past few months. In many of these cases removed and the home placed on a better basis. Some incorrigible children have been placed under the helpful environment, and some neglected children have secured better homes. Nine children have been placed in the Children's Aid Home on Pender street until better environment could be secured. Eight boys have been brought before the juvenile court, most of whom were allowed out of suspended sentence, only one being sent to the House of Correction. The work accomplished by the society is very gratifying and will result in the development of better citizens than could be possible without the work of the present organization.

CHARGE AGAINST ITALIANS.
