## SOLDIERS SIDING

COSSACKS OBJECT TO TASK OF SUPPRESSION

Are Arxious to Redress the Wrong They Have Been Compelled to

St. Petersburg, June 14.—The radical

elements in the lower house of parliament are getting more and more out of most doubt whether the surrend authority of parliament is growing con stantly in the country, and if the extreme elements can be held in check a little longer the leaders hope tha when the crisis comes the government will realize the futility of resistance. On the other hand the agraria movement, which is now extending all directions, threatens the parliame as well as the government, and it ncreasingly manifest that the troop who come from villages are siding wit the peasants from whom they are re cruited. Even the Cossacks are begin ning to rebel against the odious wor of holding the people in subjection. M. Svesshnikoff, a Cossack memb of the lower house, claims to have received a thousand letters from Co sack soldiers saying they are tired playing the role of the oppressor of people, and they desire to right the wrongs they have been compelled to in-

flict on the nation. The official inquiry into the death of Father Gapon has resulted in a verdict that Gapon was murdered by Ruten berg and two accomplices. The government has formally demanded the extradition of Rutenberg from Switzer land, whence he fled from Finland.

Sentenced to Death.

Moscow, June 14 .- Michaelmin, the vorkman who murdered Nicholas Bauman, the revolutionist, whose funeral November 2nd, 1905, was the occasion of a great liberal demonstration, was to-day sentenced to imprisonment for a year and a half.

About 300,000 persons took part in Bauman's funeral with red flag and banners flying. A choir of 300 trained singers chanted a requiem, while thousands in the procession sang the "Marsellaise." The immense size of the procession caused slow progress, and when darkness had fallen the cemetery was still four miles distant. It was one of the largest political demonstrations ever witnessed in Russtreets of Moscow after the proclamtober 30th, waving a red flag when Michaelmin, a former soldier, rushed out of the throng and brained him with an iron bar. Later in the day Michaelmin surrendered himself to the police, boasting that he had commi ted the deed out of loyalty to the Em peror and fidelity to his oath.
