MONTREAL, April 27.—The number of dead up to noon today in the land-slide disaster was stated to be thirty-five, another being found missing this morning. Some families have lost cruelly by death. The Lapointes alone lost eleven and this affects over a score of families in the district. Stories of the almost miraculous escape of the survivors continue to come from La Salotte but it is impossible to verify many of these as no corroboration can be obtained. One little girl, Grace Destardine, eccaped immediate death by drowning by hanging on to a window, but she dide later yesterday from exposure and the terrible bruises she received from the ice blocks and the debris, as she was swept down by the torrent. Many Cases Located at Caracas—Many Simple Services Held Today in West-Persons Leaving the Country-Precautions Being Taken.

HELD THIS AFTERNOON

The funeral of the late Dr. J. Henry Scammell took place this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Private service was conducted at his late home, Germain street, at 2-30, after which the body was taken to Trinity church. Interment was made in Fernhill cemetery.
