# Bermuda Trip Women Are Invariably Pleased With Delights of Southern Voyage

Girl Who Won Bermuda Trip Writes Entertainingly About It—Would Work Three Times as Hard to Win Second Tour to Bermuda—Advices Girls to Go In and Win.

at the Grand Central Station in New York, March 30, we were at once taken to a sight seeing automobile. A tour of upper New York, the shopping, residence and business districts was enjoyed, giving us a good idea of the great metropolis.

"This ride ended at Hotel Cumberland, where we had a most enjoyable dinner awaiting us. In the evening we were escorted to the Hippodrome, which was a wonder to us all. It was impossible to describe the immense auditorium and the performance held there.

"We had breakfast at an early hour next morning, and at 10.30 a.m., we were all at Pier No. 47, ready to start on our ocean voyage to the Bermuda Islands.

"When we arrived at Hamilton, Bermuda, seasickness was forgotten; everyone was well and happy. We were taken to the best hotel, for nothing seemed to be too good for us.

"There are no street cars, automobiles or theatres in Bermuda and one would wonder where the pleasure was. But there are sailing, canoeing, horseback and bicycle riding, driving and bathing.

"On every side are lily fields, rose gardens and banana plantations, which are a wonder to the American girl. The houses are all built of white stone. The natives are very highly cultivated, and speak with a decided English accent. We experienced some difficulty at first with

the English money, but we soon got used to it. The weather is soft and balmy, but the air is very damp. "We were taken on several trips, including the drive to St. George's Devil's Hole, Admiral's Cave, Isle of Wight and the Coral Reefs, where we went in glass bottom boats.

"There is no hustle bustle in Bermuda; it is a free, happy life, entirely different from the noisy confining city. We spent eight days at the islands and it was one round of pleasure from morning till night.

"How we all wished the moment we had to start for home. Our voyage back to New York was a pleasant one for we could not cease extolling the beauties of what we had seen.

"We are now all back in our home towns, thinking only of the glorious time we had.

"If girls could only realize what a beautiful trip was before them they would enter any contest with vigor, determined to win.

"It would work three times as hard rather than miss the trip to the land of the 'I'lly and the Rose'.
