

TANGO DANCE LAW SUIT

Montreal Teachers of Latest Whirl in Dispute—Each Claim Right to Correct Version.

Montreal, Nov. 26.—The Superior Court of Montreal will be called upon to decide what the real Simon pure tango dance is and as to whether one teacher may restrain or bar a rival from teaching this latest form of tango exercise. An action for \$10,000 damages was entered today by Samuel Laing, instructor of tango dancing in Auditorium Hall against F. H. Norman, instructor of dancing in Stanley Hall.

NEED OF CO-OPERATION BETWEEN CHURCHES IN MISSION FIELD

Home Mission Committee of Presbyterian Church Met in Halifax—Six Sec. Sustaining.

The Home Mission Committee of the Presbyterian Synod met in Halifax on Tuesday of this week. Rev. James Ross, superintendent of missions; Rev. Gordon Dickie, convener of the Presbytery of St. John, and Rev. J. A. MacKinnon, members of the committee, returned to the city last evening.

The report of student missionaries was one of the chief items on the docket of business. Between fifty and sixty students were employed in the mission fields last summer, and out of this number over thirty were allotted to New Brunswick six fields in the Presbytery of St. John were self-sustaining this year, and only small grants were necessary for the others.

STOCK EXCHANGE WILL TAKE STEPS TO ASSIST PUBLIC

Will Ask Adoption of Uniform Measures for Greater Protection of Investing Public.

New York, Nov. 26.—The New York Stock Exchange, through its governing board today announced its intention to co-operate in the future as far as possible in bringing about the adoption of uniform measures for the greater protection of the investing public through more careful supervision of corporation organization. To this end it will recommend greater publicity and fuller and more frequent reports of operations than has been customary with many corporations in the past.

CORNER GIRL WITH MOTHER

Chief Clerk Explains Why More Recent Developments of the Case Have Been Kept Secret.

Irene Cormier, the fourteen year old girl, whose disappearance has given rise to a number of theories, is with her mother according to official information given yesterday. While it was announced on Tuesday night that the girl had been located it could not be ascertained at the time as to her exact whereabouts. It was given out definitely yesterday by the police that she is with her mother. It was not until Tuesday that the different clues which were followed brought definite results. Considerable comment was made concerning the secrecy of the affair, but speaking of the matter last night Chief Clerk said that there had not been much secrecy until the whereabouts of the girl had been definitely learned. Asked why the secrecy was then maintained he pointed out that it was in the interest of both the girl and her mother. The latter, since coming here, was married again and not wishing the relatives of her husband to know of the girl's existence, it was for this reason that the secrecy has been kept.

RIFLE ASSOCIATION IN ANNUAL SESSION

Excellent Progress Shown by Year's Reports—Financial Status Most Encouraging—Elected Officers

The annual meeting of the New Brunswick Rifle Association was held last night in the rooms of the 62nd Regiment, when officers for the year were elected as follows: President, Col. H. H. McLean; vice-pres., Major J. M. Kinnear; 2nd vice-pres., Lieut. Col. Wetmore; council, Lieut. C. A. Estey, W. Balmain, Dr. J. White, Dr. R. L. Ellis, A. R. Boss, Lieut. D. R. Chandler, H. H. Bartlett, Dr. J. McNichol, Capt. W. E. Forbes, Major G. S. Kinnear, Major H. Perley, Major W. C. Magee, Capt. Manning, Sgt. J. G. Sullivan, Lieut. Archibald, N. J. Morrison, H. A. Chandler and Sgt. E. F. Gladwin. The annual reports for the year were found satisfactory. The financial status of the association was encouraging and was discussed by the meeting. A particularly pleasing feature of the year's reports showed was the increase in interest which manifested in the different matches held under the auspices of the association. Among the items of new business brought up for the decision of the meeting was the question of the militia corps or affiliated rifle associations taking part in provincial matches. DANGERS TO NAVIGATION New York, Nov. 25.—(Reported to the Hydrographic office)—A derelict was sighted Nov 22 in lat 38 58 N, lon 66 08 W. Stmr Appalachee (Br) reports Nov 14, lat 42 29 N, lon 58 22 W, saw a very rusty conical buoy, apparently black, having an aperture on top, probably for a whistle; Nov. 12, lat 44 40, lon 48 11, saw a spar standing upright and projecting about three or four feet out of water. Stmr Riverdale (Br) reports Nov 11, lat 30 04 N, lon 48 57 W, passed a very rusty red conical buoy, with lower part thickly covered with barnacles.

May, Windsor, N. S., via New Bedford, Mass., for New York, with lumber, in tow of the tug John G. Chandler, took fire in her spanker off Fanning's Island, Long Island Sound, Monday night. The fire is supposed to have been started by a spark from the tug. Considerable damage was done to the cabin and stern. The fire was extinguished by the tug.
