RECRUITING FELL AWAY ON SATURDAY

Three Men Were Enlisted; a Number of Others Failed to Pass—The Forestry Unit—Banquet Tonight

Recruiting fell away in St. John for the weekend, only three men enlisting. The Klites Battalion carried off first honors, securing two out of the three.

To Start Recruiting.
With this week will commence recruiting for the Special New Brunswick Forestry Unit which Major C. Lionel Hamilton has been authorized to raise consisting of eleven officers and three hundred and fifty men.

Major Hamilton accompanied by Major J. G. Kirkpatrick who is second in command, returned to St. John by the Boston express Saturday night from Fredericton where a recruiting office has been opened which will be in charge of J. Stanley Scott, a well known lumber operator who has consented to accept appointment as lieutenant and will organize York, Queens and Sunbury counties.

Announcement has been made that Charles Smith of the Tobique River, also a well known lumber operator and a qualified officer in the militia, will receive appointment in this unit, and that Capt. Thomas McMillan of Canterbury whose life-long training has been along lumbering lines, is to be another appointee.

In Restigouche Lieut. W. A. Ferguson has been given command of a platoon, and will find little difficulty it is thought in securing his required number of practical men.

Seven out of eight lieutenants in this unit will be well known experienced lumbermen of the province, and under officers of this kind, this unit of skilled New Brunswickers will undoubtedly give a fine account of itself when it takes on its duties in the forests of the old country.

Banquet Tonight

The returned New Brunswick officers will hold a banquet tonight at the Union Club. Lieut.-Col. McAvity will preside. Fully one hundred officers are expected to be present. Several outside officers reached the city Saturday night. It is also the intention of those in charge to have the talent from the Opera House, after the second show, to assist in making the evening a pleasant one.

This banquet will no doubt be the initial one of what promises to be a regular annual affair, and it is likely that it will be held in Ottawa in after years, when all the officers in the Dominion will be in attendance.

Will Entertain E. W. V. A.

ICE RUNNING OUT OF N. B. STREAMS

First Up-River Steamers Left St. John Saturday — Log Driving Starts this Week — Railway Washed Out Up North.

The ice is running out of the rivers of New Brunswick and some of them, including the St. John and Petitcodiac, are clear. The ice in the Miramichi is weakening rapidly and has started at a number of points. The ice in Shediac harbor has also broken up. The first boats to go up the St. John river for the season were the Majestic, which left Saturday for Gagetown, and the Ooness for Wickham, eight days later than in 1916. The snow ferry at Gouda Point crossed the Kennebecasis River for the first time for the season Saturday morning.

First Boat at Capital.

The first steamer to arrive at Fredericton in 1917 was the tug Eva Johnson, which went up from Gouda Point Saturday, mooring at the wharf at the St. John River Log Driving Company at St. Mary's. The Wason and other tugs left St. John the same day. Manager Walter Jackson stated that the work of hauling the booms will begin at once. The fall of the Kingsclear ice jam went out Friday night, making quite a heavy run and now no further damage is anticipated from the ice. The water is remaining at a sturdy height, the heavy rain of Saturday night swelling the freshet.

Stream Driving.

Stream driving on the smaller streams and rivers of the central part of New Brunswick has been under way for several days.

Near Wreck.

A big ice and log jam at the Canada Eastern Railway bridge, at Doaktown, caused a washout of about fifty rods of railway track. The jam formed last week and backed the water up the river forcing the current into the intervals a short distance west of the bridge where it began to eat away the roadbed, and shortly after the Newcastle-bound express passed part of the track was washed out.

Those who took part were: Pearl Madden, Doris Sargent, Millie Morrell, Dorothy Crockett, Roberta Scott and Alice Van Horn. The sum of \$5.50 was realized and this will be sent to the S. C. A. treasurer.

Soldiers Allowed Freedom.

In the cases against Michael Mansfield, Edward Bean and Reed Hill, all soldiers, charged with breaking and entering the liquor store of P. Sullivan, Reed's Point, before Judge Armstrong Saturday, the prisoners claimed they were under the influence of liquor, and that the breaking of the plate glass window in Mr. Sullivan's store was accidental. There was some evidence of a flask being stolen along to one of the overseas battalions in the city, on making restitution of the amount of damages, which was in the vicinity of \$45, they were allowed to go on suspended sentence.

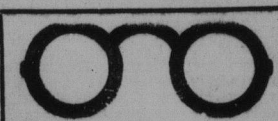
