Inspected Site Of Jardine Bridge

C.N.R. Officials With Others Made Inspection Regarding Marsh Creek — Arrangements to be Made to Protect Marsh Lands.

W. R. Devenish, District Superintendent of the Canadian National Railway at Montreal, accompanied by Mr. Torrance, of the engineering branch, inspected the site of the Jardine Bridge, near the One-Mile House, in company with J. S. Clayton, chairman of the Great Marsh Commission, and Messrs. Rafferty and Donovan, the two members of the board. The secretary to the Premier, E. S. Carter, represented the Government at the conference, which was a result of representations having been made to the Provincial Government and the Public Works Department that because of the constant dumping of ashes at or near the round-house of the railway and also because of the proposed filling of the Marsh Creek so as to leave only a passage-way of 14 feet for the flow of water at the site of the Jardine Bridge, the drainage of the marsh lands out to and beyond the Three-Mile House was very likely to be seriously affected by these encroachments on the flowing area of the Marsh Creek.

The contention of the Commission was that if the passageway of the Creek was narrowed at the Jardine Bridge the water would be held back along the whole length of the Creek even up to and extending through the Glen Falls area, so that the ditches would not be given an opportunity to drain completely or time enough between the tides to do so. They also contended that the marshes and gathering about such an embankment bridge with only a 14-foot space for flowage would hold back the water and prevent it flowing to the gates under the Marsh Bridge.

It was pointed out by Mr. Carter that if the drainage was interfered with at all it would be a very serious matter for the new tar-macadam road from St. John to Brookville, as the water held back would gradually soak and undermine the highway and make the surface far less durable.

It is quite probable in view of the cause of the representations that were made to the railway authorities that engineers representing both the Great Marsh Commission and the Government and also the Railway will confer and endeavor to arrive at such an arrangement as will enable the railway to make their extensions without hindrance and at the same time to protect the marsh lands that have always been drained by the Marsh Creek.

PLEADED GUILTY TO SHOOTING OFFICER

John Melanson Informs Court He Shot Policeman Stinson — He and Jean Thibedeau Sent up for Trial Yesterday

Jean Thibedeau and John Melanson, alias Emilie Comeau, were brought before Magistrate Allingham yesterday morning at Fairville, on the charge of shooting Police Officer William Stinson, on Sunday night, November 15th. Melanson pleaded guilty to having fired the shot that pierced the policeman's body beneath the arm, when he was trying to arrest the accused for having liquor. The court was first held in the court room at Fairville, where Detectives Biddiscombe and Power gave evidence, also Dr. John Allingham, and L. W. Goodall, police marshal of St. George. The court then adjourned to the home of Officer Stinson, Prospect street, where the evidence of Stinson and his wife was taken. The officer identified Melanson as his assailant. As Thibedeau could not understand English, Simon Legere acted as interpreter. Both Melanson and Thibedeau were sent up for trial by the magistrate.

PRICE OF COAL TO TAKE DROP IN LONDON

London, Nov. 24.—Sir Auckland G. Geddes, Minister of National Service and Re-construction, announced in the House of Commons today that the price of coal for household use would be reduced ten shillings per ton, beginning with December 1.

Prince's Farewell Speech At Halifax Full of Gratitude for Reception Given Him Here

(Continued from page one.)

"The other great thing which this first visit has done for me, is to give me a thorough understanding of all that Canada stands for on the North Atlantic continent. I realized that pretty fully before I left Ottawa, a fortnight ago, but I realize it even more fully now since my visit to the United States. You are the guardians of British institutions upon this continent, and your development as a nation of increasing power and influence will be one of the most important factors in determining relations between the British Empire and the United States.

"This wonderful journey through the Dominion has meant so much to me that I appreciate in the fullest degree the wisdom of you, Sir Robert, said just now about the value of constant personal intercourse. Nothing can go wrong with the British Empire if all nations maintain this intercourse and understand each other's standpoint.

"Feeling all this very strongly, I also appreciate most deeply what Sir Robert has said about the value of close understanding between the Sovereign and his people throughout the Empire, and I can assure you that no one feels this more keenly than the King. The King's feelings in this respect need, I think, no explanation from me in view of the fact that he has sent me on this four months' journey this year in spite of my four years absence from the Old Country during the war.

"I think that I need not reassure you either on my own behalf for I mean to see as much of the Dominion as of Great Britain. You will notice that I have not used the word 'good-bye' and I do not intend to use it, because I hope to return to Canada soon and to return often. But I mean my future visits to be less formal. I want to travel as you travel, Sir Robert—like a Canadian in his own country, and not as an extra special visitor who may never turn up again.

"But at the conclusion of this more or less official tour, during the whole of which the Dominion government has looked after me with such kindness and hospitality, I must thank you, Sir Robert, and all your government, for the generous care which you have taken of me, and for all that you have done for me and for my staff. Sir Lionel Halsey and the other members of my staff are more than grateful and appreciative of your kindness. I hope that you will reciprocate in some degree my strong desire to be in Canada again soon and as often as possible,—an revoir."

At the conclusion of the dinner, the Prince immediately set out for Government House.

"It is not my purpose to inflict a speech on His Royal Highness tonight, for I have a shrewd suspicion that he has had about as many speeches buried at him in the course of his travels as he cares to listen to. We might divine his feelings in the story of the negro lady who applied for a divorce from her husband, and whose sole reason was that she had lost her taste for him. The Prince has not doubt lost a taste for speeches, and he will be delighted if these are curtailed somewhat.

"There are, however, some things that must be said. As far as the reception of the Prince is concerned, he has made on the Canadian people an impression that does not leave one word necessary to be added. He knows of the absolute whole-hearted admiration of all, but even in the Dominion of Canada, we realize constantly by the need of a better understanding with each other, to be followed by a more thorough co-operation. How much truer, then, does one comprehend the need for such in the worldwide community of nations who own allegiance to the British flag.

"It is also true of an understanding between the sovereign and people that there should be that mutual service so useful in the preservation of our institutions. That has been given by the visitor, His Royal Highness, in affection that has greeted the presence of His Royal Highness everywhere throughout Canada.

"The Prince, like his royal father, is a member of the Canadian Bar, and as such he is a very modest man, but he has an absolute genius for being perfectly natural at all times, and under all circumstances. This is the great charm that has won the hearts of Canadians. I feel that I do not wish to say much more, and, in closing, will use for the purpose the refrain of the old Jacobite song:

"Better lo'ed ye canna be, Will ye no' come back again?"

Large Audience at the Imperial Theatre Last Night — Pretty Girls, Tunesful Music and Amusing Comedians.

Aged Murderer Here This Morning

Joseph Cremier, Aged 75 Years, En Route to Dorchester on Life Sentence for Killing Felix Francoeur.

Joseph Cremier, the 75-year-old murderer who was sentenced by Judge McKeown to life imprisonment for the murder of Felix Francoeur at Grand Falls on September 11, was brought to the city this morning by Constable Craig, of Victoria county, and lodged in the city jail, where he stayed until the 7:10 train took him to Dorchester to serve a life sentence, the previous ruling having been changed by the Dominion Government authorities to life commitment on account of the culprit's age.

It will be remembered that the Greater trial was one of the shortest murder trials held in the Province. Judge McKeown sentencing the guilty man within three weeks after the crime was committed.

The prisoner was brought to the city unshackled and in company with the Northumberland county man just as an ordinary freeman would be. He is a man of less than average stature, with long white hair, and a rather pleasant expression. City Marshal Alexander Crawford was on hand to receive the man on behalf of the city police.
