

## CHANGED HIS MIND ABOUT TAKING LIFE

**Jumped from Boat to Commit Suicide, Saw Plank and Decided to Live.**

### LANDED ON SHORE AT LONG BEACH

**Bathers Alarmed When He Appeared—Told Several Conflicting Stories to Police**

Long Beach, N. Y., July 8.—Bathers this morning thought someone had jumped to death from a boat when they saw a full clothed man sitting on a plank, drifting toward shore. A curious crowd waited until the man landed, then many of the bathers displayed real alarm and some fled.

#### Affraid of Him

All kept at a safe distance as the man swung and his clothes and began to walk about the beach until Police Constable Monahan questioned him. Pale beneath a heavy tan, his eyes sunken and staring vacantly, the stranger made no response to Monahan's questions, and when asked to give his name scribbled "Mark Smith" on a piece of paper. Monahan provided a meal and dry clothes and took his charge to Lynbrook, where Justice of the Peace Neu attempted to solve the mystery.

The stranger plied was a foreigner and judged Neu and several local linguists failed to hit upon the right tongue. Three American pen pals in the man's pocket were the only other clues. Dr. Arthur Jacobs examined him and pronounced him exhausted, but otherwise healthy and sane. When the Rev. J. W. McKenna, of Lynbrook, entered Justice Neu's courtroom the man burst into tears.

#### Jumped From Boat

Then Gas Sabo, speaking German, found that the man's name was Nicholas Bohl, or Most, and that he had relatives at 278 Tenth Street, New York. After a rest of several hours "Most" replied incoherently to questions in English.

Later, when his mind apparently had become clearer, he informed Constable William Stroden that he had not given his right name. Then he told several conflicting stories, but he explained that he had jumped from a boat or pier in New York harbor, intending to commit suicide, but changed his mind when a plank floated by. He got astride this plank and floated through the night.

Annie G. Blakelee was appointed administratrix of the estate of Arthur G. Blakelee of Garnett Settlement, realty \$2,700 and personally \$1,158.09. John Willet, K. C. was proctor.

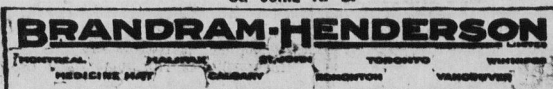

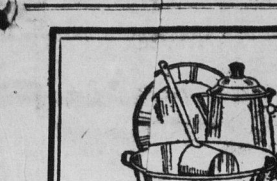
